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Explanations

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1. How does Portia prove herself trustworthy to Brutus?

- A. She has stood by him and reveals a self-inflicted wound
- B. She reveals a secret letter to Caesar
- C. She reports rumors about Caesar to the conspirators
- D. She begs Brutus to abandon the plan

Trust is shown when a person proves they can bear another's burdens and keep confidences. Portia demonstrates this by stepping into Brutus's private pain and showing she can endure hardship for him. She asks to be trusted with what troubles him and, to prove her constancy, takes a physical wound upon herself. That act isn't about seeking sympathy or forcing a plot point; it's a dramatic display that she can face danger and secrecy without breaking faith. By choosing to bear the burden beside him and to prove she will guard his troubles, she signals to Brutus that she is a reliable partner in both marriage and the cause she believes in. The other ideas don't fit because they would involve betraying Brutus or undermining his plans, or they wouldn't demonstrate loyalty and steadiness in the same way. Revealing a secret letter would show betrayal, and reporting rumors or urging him to abandon the plan would reflect doubt or manipulation rather than steadfast trust.

2. How many times is Caesar offered a crown during Lupercal?

This question tests your memory of a specific moment in the Lupercal scene and what it reveals about Caesar's character and the political mood. In that scene, Mark Antony offers Caesar the crown to test whether he will accept kingship. The moment unfolds with three distinct offers, and Caesar refuses each time. That repetition isn't just a quirky detail; it shows Caesar publicly denying monarchy while the event itself hints at his ambitions and the crowd's eagerness for a strong leader. The threefold sequence heightens tension and foreshadows the coming power struggle, since the repeated offers make his apparent humility read as political theater to some and a genuine warning to others. So three times is the correct count, not one, two, or four.

3. Who is the third partner with Antony and Octavius in the events of Acts 4 and 5?

The idea being tested is the idea of a three-person power alliance, a triune leadership known as a Triumvirate. After Julius Caesar's death, two leading figures—Octavian (the future Augustus) and Mark Antony—joined with Lepidus to form this three-way alliance, each taking a share of ruling responsibilities and territory. Lepidus is the third partner in that group, serving as a political ally who helped balance the power initially, though he was the least influential of the three and was eventually sidelined as Octavian solidified control. The other names listed are prominent Romans from different contexts: Pompey was an earlier rival of Caesar, while Brutus and Cassius were Caesar's assassins. They do not belong to the later Triumvirate with Antony and Octavius.

4. If a dependent clause comes after the independent clause, do you need a comma?

The main idea here is how commas mark introductory elements versus the flow of a sentence. When a dependent clause comes before the main clause, you usually set it off with a comma. But when the independent clause comes first and the dependent clause follows, a pause isn't needed, so no comma is used. For example, I went to bed after the game ended. The main action happens first, and the timing clause comes afterward without a comma. If the time clause came first, you'd write After the game ended, I went to bed, with the comma after the introductory dependent clause. Dashes or semicolons aren't required for this particular relationship; they aren't the standard choice here.

5. The repetition of the same phrase at the start of successive clauses is called?

Repetition of the same phrase at the start of successive clauses is called anaphora. It gives emphasis and a rhythmic momentum by opening each clause with the same words, which helps drive a point home. For example, a line that begins multiple clauses with the same phrase—"We shall" or "To think of"—creates a rising, insistent feel. To contrast briefly: anadiplosis repeats the last word of one clause at the start of the next, epistrophe repeats the same word or phrase at the ends of successive clauses, and chiasmus flips the order of parallel phrases in opposite clauses.

6. Who says, 'But Brutus said he was ambitious, and Brutus is an honorable man'?

Irony and persuasive rhetoric are being tested here. Mark Antony delivers this line during his funeral oration for Julius Caesar. Brutus had argued that Caesar was ambitious and deserved to die; Antony, while repeatedly calling Brutus "an honorable man," uses irony to undercut Brutus's claim and sow doubt in the crowd about Brutus's integrity. By presenting Caesar's will and refusing to condemn Brutus outright, Antony elicits emotion (pathos) and builds credibility (ethos) while quietly opposing Brutus. The repeated refrain functions like a steady drumbeat that makes the audience question Brutus's so-called honor without Antony having to attack him directly. That combination of irony, timing, and emotional appeal makes Mark Antony the one who speaks those words.

7. What was the name of the group Jason sailed with?

The group associated with Jason's voyage for the Golden Fleece is the Argonauts. They're named after the ship Argo, and Jason led this legendary crew of heroes on the quest to Colchis to obtain the fleece. The other terms refer to different figures in Greek myth—Olympians are the gods who live on Mount Olympus, Titans are a prior generation of divine beings, and Muses are goddess-singers of inspiration—none of which describe the crew that sailed with Jason.

8. Caesar's wife?

Calpurnia is Caesar's wife. In both Roman history and Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, she is described as Caesar's wife and appears in the drama, where she even urges him to stay home on the Ides of March. This distinguishes her from the others: Portia is Brutus's wife, Julia is Caesar's daughter, and Livia is the wife of Augustus. So Calpurnia is the correct choice.

9. From Cassius's statement about life, what does he prefer?

- A. He would rather not live than live to worship a man as ordinary as himself**
- B. He would rather die for Caesar
- C. He desires to be king
- D. He seeks a peaceful life away from politics

The key idea is Cassius's fierce value of freedom and his willingness to reject life if it means living under Caesar's rule. In the moment he's weighing what life would be like if a man he sees as merely mortal and unworthy were worshiped as ruler. He would rather die than endure a life where he's subjugated and compelled to revere someone he cannot respect. That conviction explains why the choice describing preferring not to live at all than to live as a devotee to Caesar captures his stance best. So, he isn't expressing loyalty to Caesar, a desire to become king himself, or a wish to retreat from politics. Instead, his priority is liberty and opposition to tyranny, even at the cost of his own life.

10. Parting is such sweet sorrow that I shall say goodnight till it be morrow.

This line relies on placing two opposite ideas side by side to express a nuanced feeling. The phrase "sweet sorrow" pairs sweetness with sorrow, creating a sharp, condensed contrast that heightens the emotional tension of parting. That direct juxtaposition of contradictory terms is the essence of an oxymoron. It's not presenting a statement that resolves into a deeper truth (which would be a paradox), nor is it primarily about irony or exaggeration. The moment captures bittersweet emotion—parting felt as both pleasant and painful—through the compact pairing of opposite concepts. So, the best fit here is oxymoron.
