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Explanations

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1. Perseus's most famous deed is defeating Medusa, a monster of which type?

- A. Dragon
- B. Gorgon**
- C. Hydra
- D. Chimera

Medusa is a Gorgon—the group of terrifying female monsters in Greek myth known for turning people to stone with a gaze. Perseus defeats her by using a reflective shield to avoid looking directly at her, with help from Athena and Hermes, and then beheading her. This distinguishes her from other famous monsters: a dragon is a fire-breathing reptile, a hydra is a many-headed serpent, and a chimera combines parts of different animals. The key idea is that Medusa is categorized as a Gorgon, which is why that option is the best answer.

2. Which term denotes harsh sounds used to create dissonance?

- A. Cacophony**
- B. Euphony

Cacophony captures the idea of harsh, jarring sounds that clash to create dissonance. It signals an overall noisy, disordered effect—the kind of soundscape a reader would associate with chaos or discomfort. The term comes from Greek for “bad sound,” which grows exactly from using hard, abrupt sounds and irregular rhythm to produce a sense of unease. In contrast, euphony refers to pleasant, harmonious sounds; discord is a general lack of harmony or agreement, and dissonance is the tense, unstable sound quality often produced by clashing notes. So the best fit for harsh sounds used to create dissonance is cacophony.

Ambiguity is when a word or image can be understood in more than one way. That openness to different readings is exactly what makes it the right idea here. When a single element could be taken in several plausible ways, it leaves room for interpretation rather than pointing to one fixed meaning. Think of a sentence like “I saw her duck.” It could mean I witnessed her lowering her head quickly, or that I saw her pet duck. That double possibility is ambiguity in action. In contrast, a metaphor draws a specific figurative comparison (like saying “time is a thief”) to convey a particular idea, and symbolism usually points to a broader concept that a reader is meant to recognize within a shared context. Irony involves a contrast between what is said and what is meant, often highlighting discrepancy rather than simply offering multiple legitimate readings. So the hallmark of the concept here is the presence of more than one valid interpretation for the same word or image.

This line hinges on personification of the body to show a belief that deeds speak louder than words. Casca wants his hands—the instrument of action—to carry his message, rather than his spoken words. Casca is one of the conspirators in Julius Caesar and is portrayed as blunt and action-oriented. By telling his hands to speak for him, he signals that he intends to act decisively—the stabbing and the physical act will communicate his resolve more clearly than any explanation could. Calphurnia speaks in terms of omens and warnings, not about actions taking the place of speech. Antony, famous for his persuasive oratory, relies on words to sway the crowd. Caesar, tied to his reputation and authority, wouldn't frame his stance as his hands speaking for him. So this line fits Casca's practical, action-first mindset, making him the speaker in that moment.

5. Which line is spoken by Artemidorus?

Identifying Artemidorus's line hinges on his role as a citizen who tries to warn Caesar about the conspiracy. The line that begins with "Caesar, beware of Brutus. Watch Cassius. Don't go near Casca. Keep an eye on Cinna. Don't trust Trebonius" is him directly addressing Caesar and listing the conspirators, as he attempts to hand over a warning letter before the Ides of March. It captures his purpose in the scene: to intervene and protect the ruler by naming the dangers he faces. The other lines are spoken by different characters in other moments: Caesar's exclamation after Brutus betrays him; Calphurnia's omen about omens foretelling a prince's death. So they don't fit Artemidorus's action or voice.

6. "Strong, strength, strengthen the heart" is an example of which device?

This example uses polypoton: the same root word is repeated in different grammatical forms. Strong, strength, and strengthen all come from the same root and appear as adjective, noun, and verb, respectively, all tied to the idea of power or firmness related to the heart. That deliberate variation of form emphasizes the concept from multiple angles. While you can notice a shared initial letter cluster with str- in the words, the stronger feature here is the shifting part of speech and meaning of the same root, which is what polypoton captures. It isn't about repeating a word at the end of one clause and at the start of the next (anadiplosis), nor about repeating initial sounds as in alliteration. The focus is on the root morphing through different word forms.

7. What was the name of the group Jason sailed with?

The group associated with Jason's voyage for the Golden Fleece is the Argonauts. They're named after the ship Argo, and Jason led this legendary crew of heroes on the quest to Colchis to obtain the fleece. The other terms refer to different figures in Greek myth—Olympians are the gods who live on Mount Olympus, Titans are a prior generation of divine beings, and Muses are goddess-singers of inspiration—none of which describe the crew that sailed with Jason.

You're being asked to name the conspirators who plotted Caesar's murder in Shakespeare's Julius Caesar. The group that joins Brutus and Cassius includes Casca, Decius Brutus, Metellus Cimber, Cinna, and Trebonius. These characters actively participate in the plot and help carry out the assassination in the Senate, with Decius Brutus persuading Caesar to go to the Senate, Casca delivering the first stab, and Trebonius distracting Antony. Pompey, Antony, and Lepidus are not part of the conspiracy to kill Caesar; Pompey is Caesar's rival who is dead, Antony is Caesar's ally who opposes the conspirators later, and Lepidus is a later political ally, not a conspirator in the murder. The listed seven names are the actual conspirators, so that option is the correct one.

9. Which figure of speech involves describing one sensory experience in terms of another, such as color described as loud?

Synesthesia is a cross-sensory effect in language, where one sense is described using terms from another. Describing color as loud gives a visual impression a sound-quality, inviting you to experience sight and hearing together. This goes beyond a straightforward comparison because it deliberately blends senses, which is the hallmark of synesthesia. It isn't about irony, which deals with expectations versus reality, or about onomatopoeia, which imitates actual sounds. It also isn't just a plain metaphor that sticks to only one sense. So this example best fits synesthesia: a color described with a sound attribute to create a vivid, multi-sensory image.

10. Perseus killed whom?

Perseus's most famous deed is slaying Medusa, the Gorgon whose gaze could turn anyone to stone. He accomplishes this by using a polished shield as a mirror to view Medusa safely, so he doesn't meet her eyes directly, and with Hermes' help in the form of a magical sword to decapitate her. This combination—seeing her indirectly and striking swiftly—lets him complete the task without being petrified. Medusa's head then remains a powerful tool he can employ in later adventures. The other figures come from different heroes: the Minotaur is slain by Theseus in Crete; the Hydra is brought down by Heracles; the Sphinx is defeated by Oedipus after he solves its riddle. Since Perseus is the one connected to Medusa, that is the match.
