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## **Explanations**

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### 1. Who posted the Ninety-Five Theses and sparked a Protestant Reformation?

- A. John Calvin
- B. Henry VIII

*The action being tested is the initiation of the Protestant Reformation through a public challenge to church practices. In 1517, Martin Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, criticizing the sale of indulgences and calling for debate about how the church should be run and what rooted authority should guide doctrine. This act transformed a scholarly dispute into a wider reform movement because the ideas spread rapidly via the printing press, encouraging people to question church authority and seek changes based on Scripture and faith. Other reformers did influence the movement, and later events reshaped Christianity in Europe, but the explicit act of posting the theses is tied to Luther. He articulated a stance that salvation comes through faith and that Scripture should be the ultimate authority, ideas that sparked a broader break from medieval Catholic practices.*

### 2. Which ancient civilization built pyramids and believed the pharaoh was a divine ruler along the Nile?

*Monumental tombs and the divine role of rulers are central to how ancient Egypt organized power and religion along the Nile. The pharaoh was seen as a god on earth, responsible for maintaining order and the fertility of the land. To ensure a powerful afterlife and lasting rule, pharaohs were buried in pyramids, massive tombs that symbolize both their authority and the beliefs about eternity. The Nile provided the resources and stability that made such large-scale projects possible, reinforcing the connection between royal power and divine status. This combination of pyramid building and the pharaoh's divinity is distinctive of ancient Egypt. Other civilizations followed different patterns: for example, the Indus Valley had advanced cities but no pyramid tombs associated with a divine king along the Nile; the Shang Dynasty and Mesopotamia built different types of monumental structures (like tombs or ziggurats) and did not frame their rulers in the same divine, Nile-centered way.*

### 3. Which religion began in 7th-century Arabia and emphasizes the Five Pillars of Faith?

*This item tests knowledge of which religion started in 7th-century Arabia and centers on the Five Pillars of Faith. Islam began in the Arabian Peninsula in the 7th century with the Prophet Muhammad in Mecca and Medina, and it emphasizes five core practices: the declaration of faith (shahada), daily prayer (salat) five times a day, charitable giving (zakat), fasting during Ramadan (sawm), and the pilgrimage to Mecca (hajj) for those who can. These pillars shape Muslim worship and daily life and anchor the belief in one God and Muhammad as his messenger. The other traditions stem from different regions and historical periods and do not revolve around these five practices, so they don't fit the description.*

#### 4. Which symbol is traditionally associated with Louis XIV?

*Rulers use symbols to project power and shape how people view their authority. Louis XIV specifically adopted the Sun as his emblem to show that he was the center of the realm and that power radiates outward from him. He became known as the Sun King, and sun imagery appeared in his portraits, art, and the elaborate designs of Versailles and court rituals. This branding made the sun the most fitting symbol for his reign because it directly conveys his centralized, radiant authority. A generic crown is a common royal symbol but doesn't capture the unique personal branding Louis XIV crafted. The Moon and the Star aren't closely tied to his reign or image in the same way, so they don't fit as well.*

#### 5. Which philosopher wrote Leviathan and argued that without a strong ruler, life would be chaotic and that absolute monarchy is necessary?

*The main idea tested here is why some political thinkers argue for a strong centralized authority to prevent chaos. Thomas Hobbes, in Leviathan, paints a bleak picture of the state of nature—life would be "solitary, poor, nasty, brutish, and short" without a controlling power. To escape that fearfully anarchic condition, people enter into a social contract and cede their individual rights to a sovereign who holds universal authority. That sovereign's power must be almost absolute to keep order, because any hint of weakness invites conflict and the breakdown of peace. This is why Hobbes argues that an absolute ruler—often envisioned as a strong monarchy—is necessary to maintain security and civil society. Other Enlightenment thinkers offered different visions—Locke argued for government with limited powers and protection of natural rights; Rousseau emphasized the general will and popular sovereignty; Voltaire critiqued abuses and defended civil liberties—but Leviathan is Hobbes's clear case for why absolute monarchy is needed to prevent chaos.*

#### 6. What was the English republic established after the Civil War commonly called?

*The main idea here is recognizing the form of government England had after the Civil War. When the monarchy was abolished and Charles I was executed, England was governed without a king and was openly run by Parliament as a republic. This period is commonly called the Commonwealth—the Commonwealth of England—highlighting rule without a monarch. It lasted until the monarchy was restored in 1660. The other terms don't fit: Restoration refers to bringing back the king, Empire points to a realm under monarchical rule with colonies, and Confederacy is a term from a different historical context.*

**7. In ancient Egypt, which of the following was a legal right for women?**

- A. Serve as priests
- B. Own property**

*Owning property shows a woman's formal legal status and economic independence in ancient Egypt. The law allowed women to inherit land and possessions, hold property in their own name, and manage money or assets. This meant a wife could own a house, farmland, or a dowry, and she could engage in contracts or handle property matters in court. In contrast, voting or elections didn't exist in ancient Egypt, and public office was not a general option for women. While some women could serve in religious roles, that wasn't a universal legal right for women as such. So the clearest, widely recognized legal right for women was the ability to own property.*

**8. Which absolute monarch of Russia allowed nobles to have control over serfs and won control of a warm-water port?**

- A. Peter the Great
- B. Ivan the Terrible
- C. Catherine the Great**
- D. Alexander II

*Holding onto autocratic power while expanding Russia's territory shows up in Catherine the Great's reign through two defining moves: reinforcing noble authority over peasants and securing a warm-water port. She reinforced feudal privileges that let the nobility exercise control over the serfs on their estates, keeping peasants bound to land and under noble authority even as she modernized many state structures. At the same time, her victories in the Russo-Turkish Wars and the 1783 annexation of Crimea opened access to the Black Sea, giving Russia a crucial warm-water port that could be used year-round for trade and defense. This combination of strengthening noble power over serfs and gaining a strategic port fits Catherine the Great best. Peter the Great did pursue a warm-water port as well, but his reforms moved toward broader state centralization and modernization rather than maintaining noble serf privileges in the same way; Ivan the Terrible and Alexander II pursued different paths—centralization and then emancipation, respectively—so they don't fit the specific pairing as closely.*

**9. Which civilization is known for using quipu as a record-keeping method?**

*Quipu are knotted cords used for recording information, and the Inca Empire is the civilization most associated with this method of administration. Across their vast Andean realm, quipu tracked censuses, taxes, tribute, labor obligations, and supplies, serving as a non-writing system that helped manage resources. The knots and cord structure encode numbers in a decimal system, with color and placement signaling categories like region or type of good. Other civilizations listed relied on writing or pictorial records—Maya with its glyphs, Aztec with codices, and Mali more often on oral tradition and other forms of record-keeping—so quipu stands out as the hallmark method for the Inca.*

**10. Which Archbishop was executed by the Long Parliament for his opposition to Puritans?**

*William Laud, the Archbishop of Canterbury, led the king's push to enforce a high Anglican form of worship and discipline across England. Puritans in Parliament saw these policies as a direct threat to their reforms and to the liberties they claimed for the church and realm. When the Long Parliament moved against those who supported royal authority and opposed Puritan ascendancy, Laud was tried and executed in 1645, symbolizing Parliament's dominance over church leadership during the Civil War era. The other figures were from earlier centuries or held different roles, not the same context of opposing Puritan reforms under the Long Parliament.*
