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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which term describes the pattern of increasing global economic, cultural, and political connections since the late 20th century?**

*Globalization describes the pattern of increasingly interconnected economies, cultures, and political systems across the world, a trend that intensified from the late 20th century as technologies like the internet and transportation improved, trade barriers fell, and international institutions and agreements expanded. It captures how goods, services, money, ideas, and people move across borders, creating a more integrated global system—from multinational companies and global supply chains to cross-cultural exchange and cooperative efforts on global issues. Isolationism points toward reducing foreign ties rather than expanding them; mercantilism is an early modern economic doctrine focused on accumulating wealth through a favorable balance of trade, often via protectionism; feudalism is a medieval social order with localized loyalties that does not describe global linkages.*

**2. Which thinker authored Two Treatises on Government and emphasized natural rights and the right to rebel if the government is tyrannical?**

*Natural rights and the right to resist tyranny are central here. John Locke is the thinker who links those ideas to government by consent in his Two Treatises on Government. In this work, he argues that people are born with natural rights—life, liberty, and property—and that governments exist to protect those rights. Because power is derived from the people, if rulers become tyrannical and violate these rights, the people not only may but morally may withdraw their consent and establish a new government. This view laid the groundwork for liberal political philosophy and influenced revolutionary movements that justify overthrow of tyrannical authority. The other thinkers were not the authors of this work and did not articulate the same justification for rebellion: Hobbes favored a strong sovereign to prevent chaos, Montesquieu emphasized the separation of powers, and Voltaire advocated for civil liberties but did not write these treatises.*

*Quipu are knotted cords used for recording information, and the Inca Empire is the civilization most associated with this method of administration. Across their vast Andean realm, quipu tracked censuses, taxes, tribute, labor obligations, and supplies, serving as a non-writing system that helped manage resources. The knots and cord structure encode numbers in a decimal system, with color and placement signaling categories like region or type of good. Other civilizations listed relied on writing or pictorial records—Maya with its glyphs, Aztec with codices, and Mali more often on oral tradition and other forms of record-keeping—so quipu stands out as the hallmark method for the Inca.*

#### 4. In historical geography, what are latitude and longitude used for?

*Latitude and longitude create a global coordinate system that lets us pinpoint any place on Earth with precision. Latitude measures how far north or south a location is from the equator, while longitude measures how far east or west it is from the Prime Meridian. By turning a place into a pair of numbers, historians and geographers can map where events happened, trace ancient trade routes, compare sites across different times, and analyze spatial relationships—everything from where cities grew to how empires expanded. While longitude has a connection to time zones and latitude to climate patterns, the purpose of these coordinates is to locate places, not to predict climate or determine population density. Population density relies on counting people in a given area, not on the coordinate system itself.*

#### 5. Which philosopher wrote *Leviathan* and argued that without a strong ruler, life would be chaotic and that absolute monarchy is necessary?

*The main idea tested here is why some political thinkers argue for a strong centralized authority to prevent chaos. Thomas Hobbes, in *Leviathan*, paints a bleak picture of the state of nature—life would be “solitary, poor, nasty, brutish, and short” without a controlling power. To escape that fearfully anarchic condition, people enter into a social contract and cede their individual rights to a sovereign who holds universal authority. That sovereign’s power must be almost absolute to keep order, because any hint of weakness invites conflict and the breakdown of peace. This is why Hobbes argues that an absolute ruler—often envisioned as a strong monarchy—is necessary to maintain security and civil society. Other Enlightenment thinkers offered different visions—Locke argued for government with limited powers and protection of natural rights; Rousseau emphasized the general will and popular sovereignty; Voltaire critiqued abuses and defended civil liberties—but *Leviathan* is Hobbes’s clear case for why absolute monarchy is needed to prevent chaos.*

**6. What medieval system described rule where kings had limited power and nobles controlled estates?**

*Feudalism is the medieval system that fits this description. In this arrangement political power is built on land and personal loyalty rather than centralized authority. A king grants large pieces of land to powerful nobles (fiefs) in exchange for military service and sworn loyalty. Those nobles then divide portions of their land to vassals and manage estates themselves, collecting rents, dispensing justice, and mustering armies when needed. Peasants work the land in return for protection and a home. Because much of the power is localized in the hands of these lords who control estates and local courts, the king's direct authority over distant regions is limited. This creates a layered structure where loyalty, landholding, and service define power more than a strong central government. This contrasts with absolutism, which centers power in a single ruler; democracy, which emphasizes rule by the people; and oligarchy, which is rule by a small elite not organized around feudal landholding and vassalage.*

**7. Which religious group faced persecution under William Laud's Archbishopric?**

*Religious conformity within the Church of England is the central idea here. William Laud, as Archbishop of Canterbury, pushed reforms to make worship more ceremonial and to enforce bishops' authority across the church. Puritans believed the church should be reformed further and criticized the bishops and rituals Laud promoted. Because they stood against Laud's policies, Puritans faced strong pushback: ministers could be removed from their positions, sermons and books were censored, and church authorities used their power to discipline dissenters. This combination of enforcement and resistance is why Puritans are the group that faced persecution during Laud's archbishopric.*

**8. What term describes the transfer of crops, animals, diseases, and ideas between the Americas and the Old World after 1492?**

*The transfer after 1492 is described by the Columbian Exchange. This term specifically names the broad network of contacts between the Americas and the Old World that emerged after Columbus's voyages, focusing on the exchange of crops, animals, diseases, and ideas. It explains how foods like maize, potatoes, tomatoes, and cacao moved to Europe, Africa, and Asia, while crops and animals such as wheat, rice, horses, and cattle flowed into the Americas. It also accounts for the devastating spread of diseases like smallpox and measles to Indigenous populations, as well as the sharing of farming techniques and cultural practices. Other terms don't fit as well. The Silk Road refers to ancient overland routes that linked Asia and Europe long before 1492, not the post-contact global exchange. Atlantic Trade is a broad, generic phrase and doesn't specify the set of transfers described here. Mercantilism describes an economic policy about accumulating wealth and trade balances, not the actual cross-continental exchanges of goods, diseases, and ideas.*

**9. Which Mesoamerican civilization developed a sophisticated writing system and an elaborate calendar?**

*Recognizing which Mesoamerican civilization developed both a sophisticated writing system and an elaborate calendar helps distinguish Maya from their neighbors. The Maya built a true hieroglyphic writing system that could convey sounds and ideas, letting scribes record kings, histories, rituals, and myth on stone monuments and codices. They also created an intricate calendar system, pairing a 260-day ritual cycle with a 365-day solar year to form the Calendar Round, and they developed the Long Count for dating events across long time spans. This combination of a decipherable writing system and a highly developed calendar is a hallmark of the Maya. In contrast, the Olmec influenced later writing but didn't produce a fully deciphered script; the Aztec used a calendar and pictographs but their writing wasn't as extensive; the Inca relied on quipu rather than a true writing system.*

**10. Which absolute ruler of Russia moved the capital to St. Petersburg and pursued westernization?**

*Moving the capital to a western-facing city and adopting European ideas and institutions shows a ruler actively modernizing the state. Peter the Great did both: he moved the capital from Moscow to Saint Petersburg in 1712 to symbolize a break with the past and to have easier access to Europe, especially the Baltic trade routes. He also launched broad reforms aimed at westernizing government, the military, education, industry, and culture—creating a centralized bureaucracy, building a powerful navy, reorganizing the army, introducing new schools and curricula, and encouraging European-style dress and customs (even the beard tax to push toward a more European appearance). Catherine the Great pursued Western ideas as well, but the capital had already moved to Saint Petersburg, and her reign built on Peter's reforms rather than initiating the capital shift. Ivan the Terrible and Nicholas II did not move the capital to Saint Petersburg; Ivan ruled in the 16th century and Moscow was central, while Nicholas II's era focused on autocratic rule and later industrial challenges.*
