Pet stores and auction houses generally do not provide the same level of insight into the horse's background and health history. Pet stores may not sell horses at all, and auction houses can sometimes have varied reputations depending on the sellers and the horses available, increasing the risk of purchasing a horse with unknown issues. Thus, going directly to a breeder is often the best approach for ensuring the quality and suitability of the horse.

Fibrin is not a fluid but rather a protein involved in blood clotting. It plays no role in joint lubrication. Therefore, while classifying horses under Animalia acknowledges their status as animals, understanding their place within Mammalia provides a clearer insight into their biological classification.

This is in contrast to other reproductive patterns seen in different species, such as continuous breeders, who can mate at any time of the year, or monoestrus animals, which have only one breeding season per year. Unlike mares, some animals exhibit non-cyclic reproductive patterns, which do not follow a specific cycle. Understanding these differences is essential for effective management in horse breeding practices.

While the other vitamins listed also play various roles in the horse's health, they are not specifically highlighted for their direct impact on hoof growth and development in the same way.
