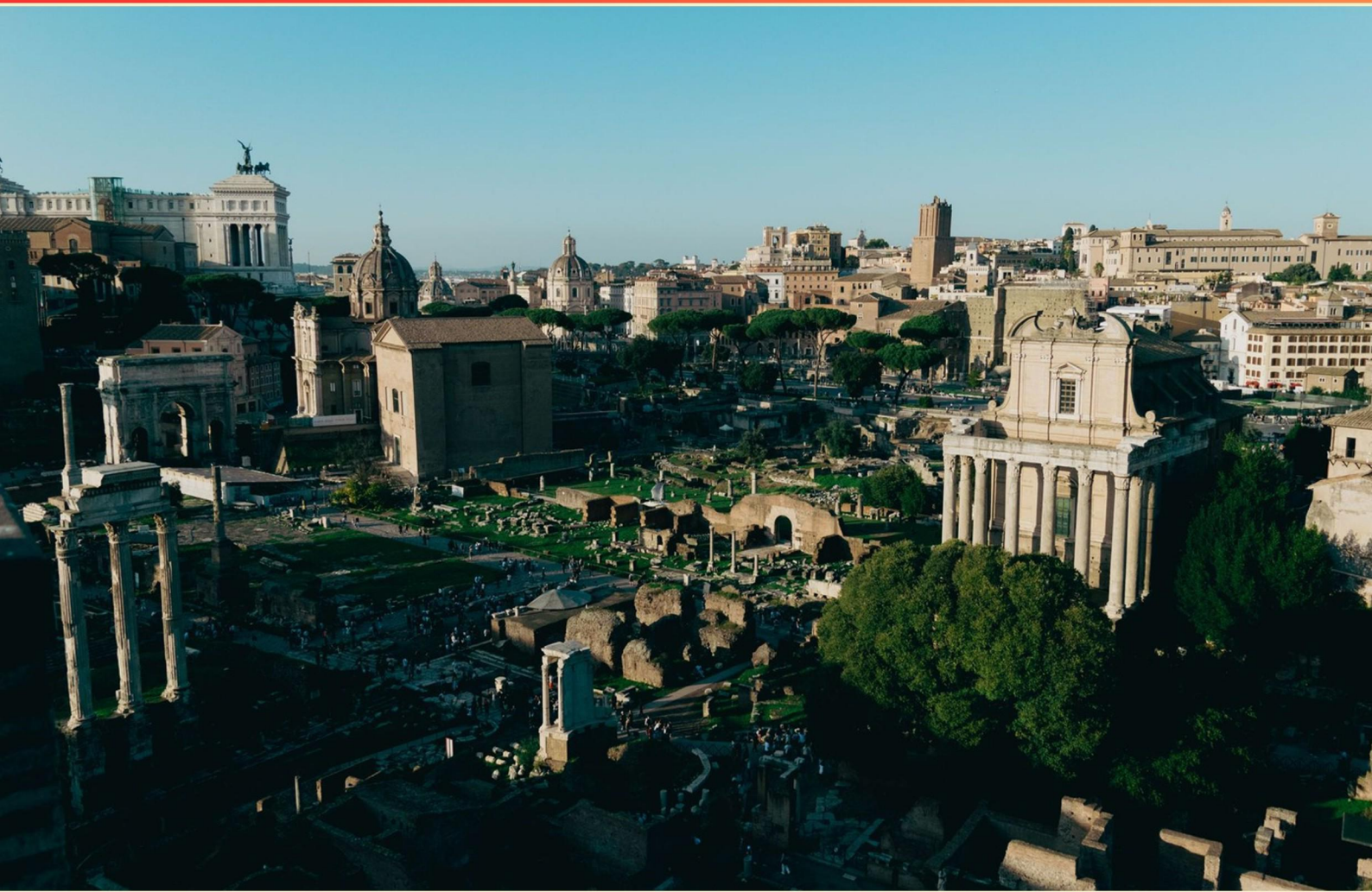

The forum served as the central public space in ancient Roman cities, evolving into a bustling hub for various activities essential to civic life.
