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Explanations

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1. How does atheism view humanity's goals and afterlife?

This understanding aligns with the nature of atheism, as it emphasizes individualism, critical thinking, and the human capacity for setting personal goals in the absence of religious or spiritual frameworks. In contrast, traditions and cultural practices can certainly influence individual goals, but they are not seen as definitive or prescriptive in an atheistic worldview.

Thus, the understanding that both could coexist represents a significant progression in Australian land law and Indigenous rights advocacy.
