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Explanations

The incorrect answer C: Hobbes is also another famous political philosopher, whose most well-known work, Leviathan, discussed the social contract and how a government should be structured, but again, it does not directly answer the question about how a ruler should govern a state. Similarly, the incorrect answer D: Rousseau was also a political philosopher, whose most famous work, The Social Contract, discussed the relationship between the individual and the state, but it did not specifically address the question about how a ruler should govern a state.

7. Who wrote The Autobiography of Malcolm X?

The Autobiography of Malcolm X was written collaboratively by Malcolm X and Alex Haley, a collaboration prompted by the latter after meeting Malcolm X and wanting to record his powerful story.
