- 1. If a player steps out of bounds while another player is about to release a try, what is the correct ruling?

When a player steps out of bounds while another player is about to release a try, the correct ruling is that a violation is called on the player who stepped out. Ignoring the behavior fails to address it, potentially allowing it to escalate. A one-minute timeout does not directly address the unsportsmanlike act nor does it serve as an appropriate response within the rules of play.
