Utilitarianism, although it involves considerations of outcomes, is more aligned with the idea of achieving the greatest good for the greatest number, which incorporates ethical reasoning rather than the straightforward notion of justifying any means for any ends. Ethical Realism also considers practical outcomes but is typically more concerned with moral truths than the stark strategic calculations of Realpolitik. Rational Choice Theory focuses on the decision-making process of individuals based on cost-benefit analyses, making it more about individual behavior rather than the justification of political
