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1. Which part of the U.S. Constitution outlines the legislative branch?

The legislative branch of the United States government is specifically outlined in Article I of the U.S. Constitution. The Secretary of State is a member of the President's Cabinet and is further down the line of succession. The Majority Leader of the Senate, while a significant political figure, does not have the authority to assume the presidency in this scenario. Hence, the Speaker of the House plays a pivotal role in ensuring the continuity of government by stepping into the presidential role when required.
