For example, suggesting fingerprints are easy to forge undermines their reliability; in reality, creating a false fingerprint that could convincingly mimic another person's unique patterns is extremely difficult. Additionally, the claim that fingerprints vary greatly among similar individuals is misleading because, while there are variations, the uniqueness of each fingerprint stands out as the defining factor. Lastly, the idea that fingerprints can change over time is not accurate in the context of their use for identification, as the unique patterns remain stable over an individual's
