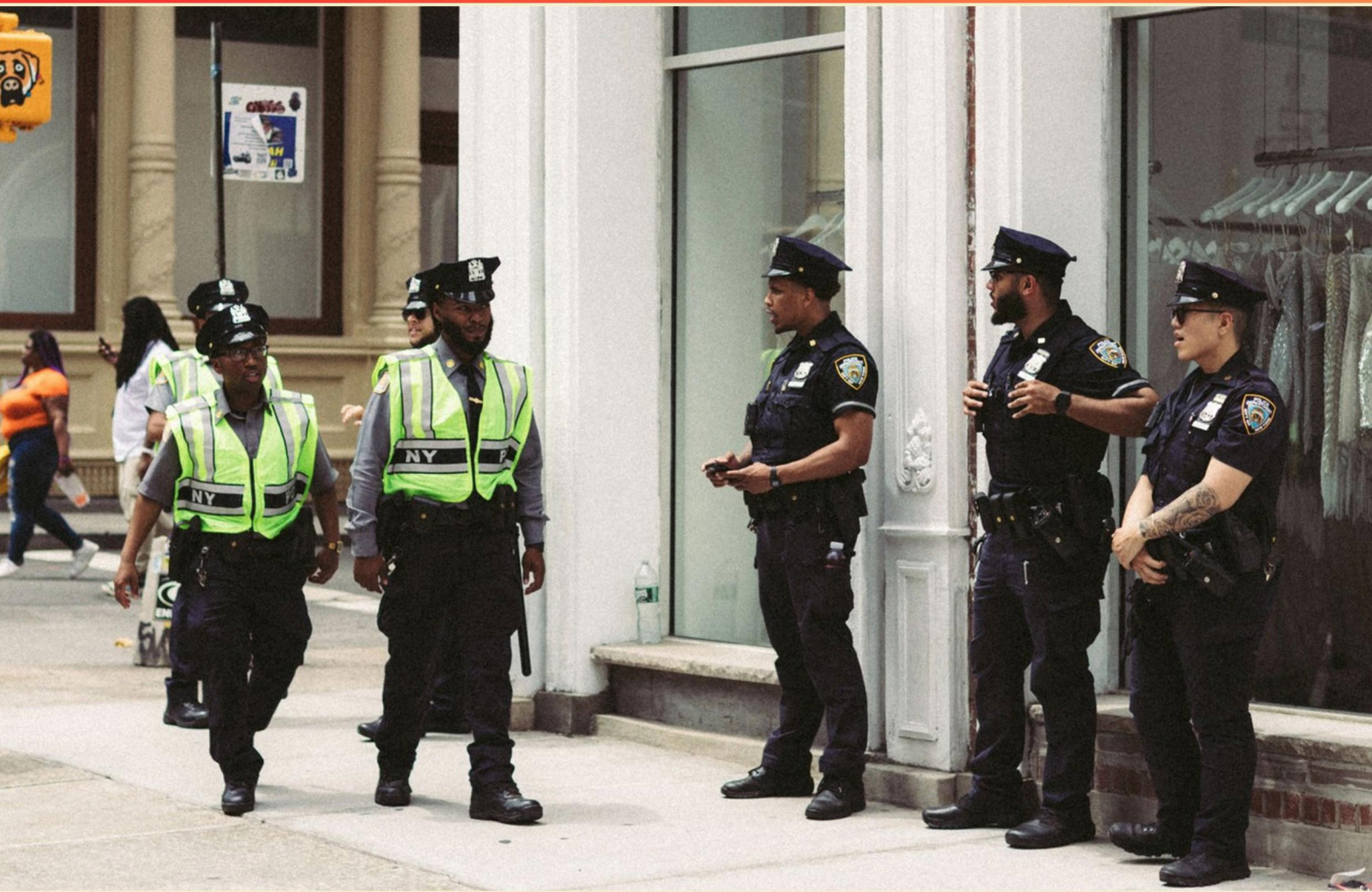

Therefore, loops stand out as the most prevalent fingerprint pattern in forensic analysis and identification.
