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Explanations

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1. What part of speech is the word "work" in the sentence "Tara is happy with her new work."?

A. Noun

B. Verb

In the sentence "Tara is happy with her new work," the word "work" functions as a noun. This is evident because it refers to a specific thing or concept—Tara's new job or tasks associated with her recent employment. Nouns are words that name people, places, things, or ideas, and "work" in this context falls squarely into the category of a thing or concept that Tara possesses.
