*The strategy of distributing cheap radios and setting up loudspeakers in public areas was a crucial tactic employed by the Nazis to ensure that their propaganda reached a broad audience. This approach effectively created a sense of community by allowing people to listen to the same broadcasts simultaneously, particularly during events like speeches from Adolf Hitler, which helped to foster a collective identity among listeners. This decision is often criticized for emboldening Hitler, leading to further aggression and ultimately World War II. The forced cession of the Sudetenland also had lasting repercussions for Czechoslovakia, as it weakened the state both militarily and politically, illustrating the failure of appeasement as a strategy to maintain peace in Europe.*

While the other choices may touch on aspects of Jewish life, they do not accurately reflect the primary consequence of Kristallnacht. Instead, the event is most notable for accelerating the emigration and flight of Jews from Germany amidst the rising tide of anti-Semitism and persecution. Thus, the choice that states it prompted many Jews to flee Germany is accurately representative*

Abandoning West Berlin would have been seen as a defeat for the Western Allies and would likely have encouraged further Soviet*

Instead of sending troops or enforcing strong economic sanctions, the League imposed limited measures that had little effect. The crisis underscored that the League was unable to prevent acts of aggression by member nations and could not enforce its resolutions. Italy's successful conquest of Ethiopia ultimately demonstrated that the League lacked the authority and unity necessary to deter aggressive actions, thereby exemplifying its fundamental weaknesses and foreshadowing its ineffectiveness as a peacekeeping body in the years leading up to World War II.*
