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Explanations

Hyperinflation refers to an extremely rapid and out-of-control price increase in the economy, which occurs when a country experiences a significant devaluation of its currency. This devaluation can result from various factors such as excessive money supply, loss of confidence in the currency, or economic instability. During hyperinflation, prices can rise dramatically in a very short time, making it nearly impossible for consumers to keep up with the increasing costs of goods and services. In contrast, deflation indicates a decrease in the general price level of goods and services, which is the opposite of what occurs during hyperinflation. Stagnation describes a situation where the economy experiences little or no growth while dealing with stagnant prices or high unemployment, not necessarily linked to currency value. Recession refers to an economic decline characterized by falling GDP and increased unemployment, which can lead to inflation but does not inherently imply the extreme price increases seen in hyperinflation. Thus, hyperinflation is the term that best describes the scenario of extreme currency devaluation leading to soaring prices.

This action helped to reduce tensions and allowed for the resumption of production in the region, contributing to economic recovery. Stresemann also negotiated substantial loans from the US, which were essential for rebuilding Germany's economy during the 1920s. These funds facilitated investment and helped stabilize the German economy, allowing for a period of relative prosperity known as the "Golden Twenties." Replacing the currency with Rentenmarks was another significant achievement, which helped to combat hyperinflation. The introduction of the Rentenmark in 1923 restored confidence in the German currency, leading to economic stabilization. In contrast, increasing reparations payments contradicts Stresemann's efforts. One of his goals was to renegotiate and reduce the burden of reparations imposed by the Treaty of Versailles, which had caused significant economic strain. Therefore, increasing reparations payments does not align with Stresemann's policies or achievements, making it the correct answer in this context.

The correct answer is representative of the political structure in the USSR, which was defined by a one-party system dominated by the Communist Party. Elections in the USSR did take place, but they were not free or fair, as the Communist Party controlled all aspects of governance, and candidates were typically pre-approved by the party. This lack of electoral choice and control over the political process exemplified the characteristics of a one-party dictatorship. The government aimed to maintain a unified ideological stance without opposition, which is a hallmark of dictatorial regimes. In contrast, a multi-party democracy would allow for multiple political factions to compete for power, providing citizens with a genuine choice during elections. Direct democracy refers to a system in which citizens directly participate in decision-making, usually through referendums, rather than through elected representatives. A monarchy involves rule by a king or queen, which was not present in the Soviet system. Therefore, the one-party dictatorship accurately encapsulates the nature of the Soviet government regarding elections.

While the other events listed also reflect challenges faced by the League, the Manchurian Crisis stands out due to the clear violation of League principles and the lack of effective intervention or repercussions, ultimately signaling the organization's struggles in addressing international conflicts.

The decision to stop working was emblematic of the workers' dissatisfaction and discontent with the situation, as they felt that their rights and sovereignty were being undermined. This passive resistance was not just a form of protest but also a strategy that the German government encouraged to undermine the legitimacy of the French presence in the Ruhr, hoping that it could lead to a diplomatic resolution. The alternative scenarios, such as working harder to show loyalty or staging violent protests, do not accurately reflect the broader context of the situation. Therefore, the choice of passive resistance aligns closely with the historical events and attitudes of the time, reflecting the workers' resolve to oppose the French occupation without escalating into outright violence.

The Potsdam Conference was held from July 17 to August 2, 1945. This response highlighted not only the determination of the Western Allies but also the importance of Berlin as a symbol of resistance against communism during the Cold War.

He openly rejected the terms of the Treaty of Versailles and sought to unify all German-speaking peoples and reclaim lost territories. This ambition was central to his foreign policy and eventually led to aggressive military campaigns at the onset of World War II, aiming to rectify what he viewed as the injustices inflicted by the Treaty.
