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Explanations

Peer groups shape identity during adolescence through multiple social processes. As teens seek belonging and autonomy, peers become a major reference point for how to act, talk, dress, and think. They provide social support that helps them feel validated and understood, which strengthens a sense of self. Peers also model behavior—teens imitate what their friends do, from everyday manners to larger choices about interests and conduct—so norms within the group become a guide for their own attitudes and actions. At the same time, peers can challenge parental norms, offering alternative viewpoints and possibilities for self-definition that parents may not present. This dynamic can push adolescents to explore different identities, styles, and values as part of forming who they are. Peer groups can encourage risk-taking or promote conformity, depending on the group's norms, which helps explain shifts in behavior, fashion, slang, and tastes during adolescence. In short, identity formation in this period is deeply intertwined with how peers influence emotions, behaviors, preferences, and social presentation across various aspects of life.

This process isn't just about blending everything into one; it can lead to homogenization where similar fashions, brands, and genres become widespread, but it also opens up cultural exchange, remixing, and hybrid identities as people draw on multiple traditions to create new styles and practices. That combination—ideas moving globally, some convergence, and simultaneous cross-cultural mixing—is what this option captures best. The other possibilities oversimplify or misrepresent the impact: media does more than isolate cultures, it actively connects them; it does have effects; and it doesn't only reinforce Western culture but enables diverse influences and hybrids.

Religious beliefs function as agents of socialization by transmitting shared norms, values, and identities across generations. Through religious education, rituals, and sacred stories, they teach what a community considers right and wrong, how to treat others, and what it means to belong. Participation in worship and rites of passage—births, coming-of-age ceremonies, marriages, and deaths—creates a sense of belonging and a defined role within the group, which strengthens social cohesion. Religious norms also shape everyday behavior and practices, such as dress, speech, dietary rules, and expectations around family life and gender roles. By combining instruction, community involvement, and meaningful rituals, religion helps integrate individuals into the wider society while maintaining a shared sense of identity.

Intersectionality shows that cultural identities are formed by multiple, overlapping categories—race, class, gender, sexuality, religion, nationality, ability, and more—and these categories interact to shape experiences of advantage or disadvantage in different contexts. This means identity isn't fixed or determined by a single factor; it shifts with situation and how different identities come together in a given setting. For example, a person's experience of gender can be influenced by race and class, producing a unique set of challenges or privileges that wouldn't be seen by looking at gender alone. This perspective helps explain why people with the same gender or race can have very different experiences, depending on how their other identities intersect.

Culture shapes identity through socialization by teaching us the norms, values, and expectations that guide how we think about ourselves and how we should behave. From family routines and schooling to peer interactions and media, we learn what counts as appropriate, which roles we're expected to play, and the symbols and language that express who we are. This process creates our self-concept—the sense of who we are—because our identities grow out of these shared meanings and the feedback we receive from others. As people encounter different experiences and cultures, their sense of self can evolve, showing that identity is continually negotiated within a social context rather than fixed at birth or determined solely by biology.

The main idea here is deterrence, which is about discouraging someone from acting by making them fear the punishment that could follow. It rests on the expectation that if rule-breaking leads to unpleasant consequences, people will think twice before doing it. Deterrence works in two ways: general deterrence aims to warn the broader public so that potential offenders stay away from crime, while specific deterrence targets the individual offender to prevent a repeat act. Social control is a broader concept—the whole system of means by which society enforces norms, including laws, police, education, and family influence. Deterrence fits inside this, as a way to reduce wrongdoing by threat or actual punishment, but it's not the whole idea. Rehabilitation focuses on reforming offenders so they won't reoffend, rather than on scaring them into compliance. Stigmatization involves labeling and social disapproval, which can deter, but it operates more through social perception and exclusion than through the explicit fear of formal punishment.

Intersectionality shows that a person's experiences of advantage or disadvantage come from the way multiple aspects of identity—such as race, gender, class, sexuality, and disability—overlap and interact with social structures like institutions, laws, and cultural norms. Because these identities don't operate in isolation, they can combine to produce unique patterns of discrimination or privilege that aren't captured by looking at a single factor alone. For example, the barriers a Black woman faces aren't just racism plus sexism stacked separately; racism and sexism interlock to create distinct experiences that differ from those of Black men or white women. This approach also explains why someone can hold privilege in one area while facing disadvantage in another, depending on how those identities intersect in society. The other statements miss this interaction view by assuming a single identity or no effect from overlapping identities.

This question tests how we name a smaller ethnic group within a larger society. Ethnicity describes a group's shared cultural traits—like language, heritage, and customs. Culture refers to the broader way of life of a group, including beliefs, values, and practices. Diversity simply refers to the presence of different groups within a society. So while those terms describe aspects of groups, only ethnic minority specifically denotes a smaller ethnic group within a larger population.
