Similarly, avoiding controversial topics can limit students' exposure to diverse opinions and ideas, hindering their ability to recognize and discuss bias when it appears in more complex or challenging texts.

The Emergent Stage primarily deals with pre-reading skills, such as understanding that text has meaning. The Syllables and Affixes Stage focuses on more complex structures in words and their combinations, rather than the fundamental vowel patterns emphasized in the Within Word Pattern Stage.*

Inferring requires readers to draw conclusions based on hints and clues within the text, which also aids comprehension but again does not emphasize the use of imagery in the same way that visualizing does.*

Other strategies, like drafting paragraphs or summarizing in a single paragraph, may not provide the same level of comparative clarity and depth, as they lack the organizational breadth that multiple columns can offer. Bullet points could help list ideas but may not encourage the same interconnected thinking required for an effective comparison.*

The other options relate to text complexity but focus on aspects that don't directly consider the reader's specific intentions and outcomes in relation to their engagement with the text. Task demands and context refer more to the situational elements surrounding the reading experience. Text structure and organization deal with how the text is constructed, while content relevancy and cultural connections involve the material itself and its significance to different audiences, instead of focusing primarily on the reader's perspective.*

*Citing textual evidence effectively involves analyzing a text to support claims, interpretations, or inferences with specific references to the text itself. This process inherently demands that students cite textual evidence to substantiate their reasoning, demonstrating their understanding of the material. In contrast, summarizing the entire text presents a broader view but does not focus specifically on providing evidence for any particular claim or interpretation. Creating visual summaries, while useful for comprehension, does not require textual citations and instead emphasizes representation and synthesis. Similarly, writing a summary of characters involves recounting information about the characters without necessarily engaging with textual evidence to support broader claims or insights. Thus, the task that most directly involves the ability to cite evidence is the one that focuses on the inference process.*
