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Explanations

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1. Which of the following statements about an extreme close-up is accurate?

- A. It focuses on a small detail such as the eyes or mouth
- B. Shows the entire scene

An extreme close-up focuses on a tiny detail of the subject, filling the frame with something like an eye or the mouth. This tight framing magnifies texture and expression, making subtle emotions and micro-details stand out rather than the surrounding environment. It isolates the subject to draw the viewer's attention directly to that specific feature, which is exactly what an extreme close-up does. That's why the other options don't fit: showing the entire scene describes a long or full shot, capturing a wide landscape describes a wide or panoramic shot, and establishing location is typically done with an establishing shot that sets where the scene takes place.

A risk assessment is a document created before production begins to identify hazards and evaluate the risks they pose to everyone involved—cast, crew, the public, as well as equipment and locations—and to plan ways to reduce or control those risks. In media projects, this means considering things like filming locations, stunts or movements, working at height, electrical gear, weather, noise, crowd scenes, animals, and ventilation, then outlining precautions such as protective gear, restricted areas, permits, training, and emergency procedures. It's about making safety decisions in advance and recording them so the team knows what needs to be done before shooting starts and can update it as plans change. This is what the risk assessment does, distinguishing it from items that occur after production (like post-production checklists), financial planning (budgets), or training sessions (safety training).

Minimising harm on a film shoot comes from doing a proper risk assessment: identifying what could cause harm, judging how likely and serious it would be, and deciding on controls to prevent or reduce those risks. This approach creates a proactive plan that covers locations, stunts, equipment and electrical safety, transportation, working hours, weather considerations, and emergency procedures, so safeguards are in place before filming begins. The weather forecast is just one factor and can't capture all hazards, while the editor's schedule and the catering menu don't address safety risks at their core.

Qualitative research aims to understand experiences, meanings, and perspectives in depth. It collects descriptive, detailed data about thoughts, feelings, and interpretations, often through interviews, open-ended questions, and observations. The focus is on exploring why people think or behave a certain way and what those experiences feel like, rather than measuring quantity or frequency. This is why the data described are rich, contextual, and non-numeric. In contrast, numerical, statistical data belong to quantitative research, which measures amount, frequency, or relationships using numbers. Historical archival data are records from the past used to examine events or trends, often with a historical angle. Forecasting models rely on quantitative data and statistical methods to predict future outcomes.

5. What is a primary role of a web developer?

Turning design into a functioning site by building, testing, and maintaining web pages using wireframes and assets from designers is the central role of a web developer. They take the plans from designers, write the code (HTML, CSS, JavaScript), implement layouts and interactivity, bring in the supplied images and assets, and then test the pages to ensure they work across devices and browsers. They also fix issues and keep the site updated as content changes. The other tasks belong to different roles: logos are created in graphic design, backend queries for data mining are about data processing and server-side work, and scripting promotional radio ads is part of marketing. The best choice describes the hands-on building and ongoing maintenance that defines web development.

6. Which organization monitors the content and delivery of TV, Internet, and mobile services?

The main idea is identifying who regulates and oversees how TV, Internet, and mobile services are delivered and what content is allowed. In the UK, that role is filled by Ofcom, the communications regulator. It licenses broadcasters, enforces standards for what can be shown and how services must perform, and handles consumer complaints about TV, radio, internet, and mobile services. This combination—regulating both content and how those services are delivered—fits exactly with what the question describes. The other organizations focus on narrower areas: the Advertising Standards Authority reviews advertising content, not all programming; the British Board of Film Classification deals with age ratings for films and some online videos but not the breadth of TV and internet content; and GDPR concerns data protection and privacy, not the broad regulation of content delivery.

7. What type of image format supports background transparency?

This question focuses on which image formats can include transparency, meaning parts of the image can be see-through, so the background shows through. The key is the alpha channel, which controls how opaque each pixel is. PNG supports transparency through an alpha channel, allowing either fully transparent or partially transparent pixels. This makes PNG ideal for images with smooth edges and variable transparency, such as logos over different backgrounds or overlays on web pages. JPEG does not support transparency at all. GIF does offer a transparent color option, but it only makes one color fully transparent and cannot handle partial transparency, so edges can look jagged. BMP isn't designed for transparency in standard use either. Because of its full alpha transparency capability, PNG is the best choice for images with background transparency.

8. What does CC BY allow?

CC BY lets people reuse a work freely as long as they give proper credit to the creator. You can copy, share, adapt, and even use it commercially, but attribution is required and you should note if you've made changes. That's why the idea that you can use it freely as long as the source is credited fits best: attribution is the essential condition for reuse. The other statements don't fit because one says no attribution is needed, which isn't true; another implies unrestricted commercial use without mentioning attribution, which isn't accurate; and another says you must obtain permission for any reuse, whereas CC BY grants permission through the license as long as attribution is provided.

9. Which statement best describes when visual effects are used?

Visual effects involve creating or integrating imagery in post-production, using computer-generated imagery to produce realistic composites. This is exactly what the option describes: realistic composites created in post-production with CGI. VFX lets filmmakers add or modify elements after filming, blending CGI with live action to achieve visuals that would be hard or impossible to capture on set. For example, adding digital environments, creatures, or complex effects that are blended into the real footage, all during post-production. The other activities listed aren't about this process: recording live sound happens on set and concerns audio, printing physical posters is about physical distribution or marketing materials, and managing social media campaigns is a marketing task.

Symbolic codes use visual elements to carry meaning beyond what they literally show. Colors, props, and lighting are classic examples: colors can signal mood or character traits (like red signaling danger or passion), props can symbolize ideas or relationships, and lighting can reveal truth, bias, or shifts in power. These signs rely on the audience's interpretation to convey messages without explicit statements. That's why the option describing visual elements that represent messages, such as colors, props, and lighting, fits best. The other possibilities focus on plot, or on sound or camera work alone, which don't capture how symbols in visuals communicate meaning across a media text.
