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Explanations

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1. In a city political machine, which role is responsible for organizing ward-level political activities?

Organizing ward-level political activities is the job of the ward boss, the person in a city machine who works directly in neighborhoods to connect with residents, recruit and coordinate precinct workers, and run get-out-the-vote efforts within the ward. They build local loyalty by addressing neighborhood needs and often managing a system of favors or patronage that keeps support organized for elections. The others operate at higher or broader levels—city clerk handles records, the mayor runs city-wide government, and the county commissioner oversees county matters—so none are as focused on neighborhood- or ward-level organization as the ward boss.

In the late 1800s, cities expanded rapidly due to industrial growth, and tens of thousands of workers moved into urban areas. Tenement housing emerged as dense, cheap multi unit buildings designed to pack as many people as possible into a small footprint near factories. They were typically several stories high, with small rooms, limited light and ventilation, shared bathrooms, and poor sanitation. Fire hazards and crowding were common, reflecting the pressure to provide inexpensive shelter for a booming workforce. That's why this option best describes tenement housing. Detached cottages on the outskirts represent suburban or rural styles, not inner-city worker housing. High rise luxury apartments for executives and large single family homes with yards were not the norm for late 19th century tenements, which were built for affordability and high density among laborers.

With the growing acceptance of germ theory, reformers saw that disease could be dramatically reduced by removing waste, ensuring safe drinking water, and properly draining sewage. These improvements cut mortality and illness, which meant a stronger, more reliable workforce and a more stable urban economy. The drive was about public health and practical benefits for city life, not private profit, immigration policy, or reducing taxes.

It best matches the concept because it centers native-born citizens and limits on newcomers, whereas the other options describe welcoming immigrants, giving them welfare, or embracing multicultural education, which are opposite in focus. In discussions of immigration and urbanization, nativist attitudes influence debates over who belongs in the public sphere and who gets access to resources.

The Immigration Act of 1924, also known as the National Origins Act, established annual numerical limits for each country and tied those limits to a percentage of that nationality living in the United States (based on the late-19th-century census). This approach intentionally favored immigrants from Northern and Western Europe while sharply reducing entries from Southern and Eastern Europe and virtually excluding most Asian immigration. That direct creation of a national-origin quota system in the 1920s is why this option is the best answer. The other laws listed either targeted a single group from earlier decades or addressed different issues entirely (land distribution or civil rights).

Diversity theories describe how societies manage and value cultural differences. The most widely discussed ideas are assimilation, multiculturalism (often called pluralism), and how integration fits into the picture as a practical approach. Assimilation envisions newcomers adopting the dominant culture and gradually blending in, like a melting pot. Multiculturalism or pluralism argues that a society can welcome diverse cultures while allowing them to maintain distinct identities, celebrating cultural differences much like a salad bowl. The option that lists these three—Assimilation, Multiculturalism and Pluralism—matches the core theoretical perspectives used in debates about diversity. The other sets mix metaphors or terms that aren't regarded as foundational theories on their own. For example, mixing metaphors such as melting pot and salad bowl with an unstandard term isn't reflecting a formal theory trio, and terms like beef stew, or combining culture-mosaic language with less conventional ideas, don't represent the main theoretical framework used in this field.

The main idea is how a powerful muckraking work can spur government action to protect public health and safety. The Jungle exposed shocking, unsanitary meatpacking conditions, which created public outrage and pressure on lawmakers. That momentum helped lead to two major federal reforms in 1906: the Meat Inspection Act, which mandated regular inspections of meat plants, and the Pure Food and Drug Act, which prohibited adulterated or misrepresented foods and medicines and established labeling requirements. These laws established federal oversight and standards that reshaped the way food and drugs were produced and sold, addressing consumer protection on a broad scale. The work also contributed to broader discussions about labor conditions, but the primary policy impact was the creation of the regulatory framework for food safety. It did not promote deregulation, and it did influence policy, not remain without effect, and it was not limited to immigrant labor rights.

Linear growth describes development that spreads along a line, often following a resource like a river, coast, or major transportation corridor. A water source or corridor acts as a spine that concentrates accessibility, amenities, and economic activity, so property values near it are higher. As you move away from that hub, land becomes cheaper and development fans out along the line. This creates the characteristic pattern of more expensive housing close to the resource and cheaper properties farther away. The statement matches this idea, reflecting how linear growth unfolds along a favorable axis.

These indicators helped officials decide who was admissible and who might be excluded for public health or security reasons. It's not about money, travel plans, or language preferences, which were not the primary gates for entry. So the letters served as a quick reference about health and political eligibility to access the country.

After ending the country-based quotas, the act established categories that give priority to relatives of U.S. citizens and lawful residents, as well as skilled workers and professionals who can contribute to the economy. This reframing aimed to diversify the immigrant pool and reduce discrimination based on national origin. That's why the best answer is that the act emphasized family reunification and skills-based immigration.
