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Explanations

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1. Which rationale aims to reduce crime by preventing offenders from committing further crimes by locking them up?

- A. Retribution
- B. Incapacitation**

The idea being tested is incapacitation. It argues that crime can be reduced by physically removing offenders from society through imprisonment, so they cannot commit further crimes while in custody. This approach focuses on preventing future offenses by limiting the offender's opportunity to offend, rather than changing behavior or deterring others. Other rationales have different aims: retribution emphasizes punishment because the offender deserves it; rehabilitation focuses on reforming the offender so they won't commit crimes in the future; deterrence tries to discourage crime by making the consequences clear to potential offenders (either the specific offender or the general public); and restitution seeks to compensate victims.

The main idea being tested is that immigration can act as a force for neighborhood revitalization, boosting local economies and strengthening social networks in ways that can reduce crime. With more economic activity and familiar social ties, residents often experience greater informal social control and collective efficacy, which can deter crime and improve safety overall. Acculturation effect centers on how immigrants adapt to language, norms, and culture in the host society, rather than on neighborhood economic renewal or crime dynamics. The neighborhood-level explanation for immigration and crime describes a broad framework of mechanisms at the local level, but the specific term for the idea of immigrants revitalizing communities and economies is the revitalization hypothesis. Self-selection focuses on the characteristics that migrants bring or select for, not on the community-wide revitalization and crime-reduction effects.

When targets are aggressive, so-called success is measured by outcomes at any cost, and there's little visibility or protection for raising concerns, employees may see illegal acts as necessary or acceptable to meet goals. That systemic pressure is what makes the environment criminogenic. The other options point to specific crimes or outcomes rather than the underlying environment. Embezzlement is a crime someone commits, not a description of the workplace setting. Fraud against government likewise denotes a type of illegal act, not the cultural context that encourages wrongdoing. Corporate violence refers to harmful actions in the workplace, which can involve illegal acts but doesn't specifically capture the notion of an environment that pressures lawful breaches. The best choice is the term that encapsulates how the organizational culture itself can generate criminal behavior.

The other concepts don't capture this initial filtering by who decides to move: the revitalization hypothesis relates to changes in crime due to urban or neighborhood renewal, the acculturation effect focuses on how immigrants adapt over time, and strain theory explains crime as a response to social pressures rather than who decides to migrate.

Battery is often the term for actual harmful contact, but in many codes the same conduct is charged as simple assault when the severity doesn't elevate it to a more serious crime. So, for deliberate conduct that results in touching or harming another person, simple assault is the best fit.

This makes it the best fit for describing being pushed to the edges due to hardship.

Normalization of deviance describes how deviant behavior becomes viewed as normal within a group, not the state of being marginalized. Prosecutorial discretion concerns decisions by prosecutors about charging and pursuing cases, a legal process concept rather than a social position. Civil disobedience involves deliberately breaking laws for political protest, which is a tactic rather than a description of social placement. Thus, social marginality best fits the scenario.

Bribery involves offering or receiving something of value to influence an official action, not consumer transactions. Fraud against government targets deceiving the government itself, such as tax or procurement fraud, not ordinary consumer purchases. So, for misrepresentation in consumer transactions, the most precise label is consumer fraud.

Understanding who high-tech criminals are hinges on describing their characteristics—their skills, tools, and ways of operating—more than the specific crimes they commit. This description captures the profile of the actors: advanced technical know-how, ability to work across borders, use of anonymity and evolving malware or exploit techniques, organizational patterns (often networks or groups), and a profit- or ideology-driven mindset. By focusing on these traits, you get a clearer picture of the actor type and how they behave, not just a single act they might perform. The other options describe actions or tactics rather than the people themselves. An affordance of trust and legitimacy refers to how criminals manipulate perceptions, not who they are. Money laundering denotes a crime type they might commit, not their overall profile. Shoplifting is a form of theft that doesn't capture what makes high-tech criminals distinctive.

Four or more people killed in a single incident at one location is called mass murder. The defining feature is that the fatalities occur in one event at one place, without a long gap between killings. This distinguishes it from serial murder, where multiple victims are killed over a longer period with cooling-off intervals and often at different locations. The other terms don't fit because simple assault involves nonfatal harm, and stranger rape refers to a sexual assault, not homicide.
