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Explanations

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1. Which is the correct imperfect tense form for 'we used to eat'?

A. Nosotros comíamos

B. Vosotros comíais

C. Tú comías

D. Uds. comían

Imperfect tense expresses past actions that were habitual or ongoing. For -er verbs like comer, the endings in imperfect are -ía, -ías, -ía, -íamos, -íais, -ían. The form for nosotros (we) is comíamos, with the accent on the i. So "nosotros comíamos" means "we used to eat." The other options shift the subject: "vosotros comíais" is you all (informal in Spain), not we; "tú comías" is you singular; "Uds. comían" is you all (ustedes) or they, not we. Thus the correct form for "we used to eat" is the nosotros form: comíamos.

2. What is the imperfect form of comer for nosotros?

In the imperfect, regular -er verbs with nosotros take the ending -íamos. The stem of comer is com-, so the form for nosotros is comíamos. This gives the sense of an ongoing or habitual past action: "we were eating" or "we used to eat." For example, Cuando éramos niños, comíamos juntos todos los viernes. The other forms shown correspond to different subjects (comía for I/you/he, comían for they/you all, comías for you), which is why they don't fit the nosotros subject.

3. Conjugate escribir in the imperfect for the subject vosotros.

En el imperfecto, los verbos regulares -er llevan las terminaciones -ía, -ías, -ía, -íamos, -íais, -ían, y para vosotros la terminación es -íais. Al unir el tronco de escribir (escrib-) con -íais, obtienes escribíais, que es la forma del imperfecto para vosotros y significa "vosotros escribíais" o "vosotros solíais escribir" en el pasado. Otras formas como escribían, escriben o escribía no encajan con vosotros: escribían es para ellos/ellas/ustedes en imperfecto, escriben es presente, y escribía es una forma singular del imperfecto (yo o él/ella/usted).

El imperfecto para verbos regulares de -er como escribir se forma añadiendo las terminaciones -ía, -ías, -ía, -íamos, -íais, -ían a la raíz escrib-. En la forma para "yo" se usa escribía, con tilde en la i para indicar la pronunciación correcta. Se emplea para expresar acciones pasadas que eran habituales o estaban en progreso: Yo escribía cartas todos los días. Las demás formas en imperfecto para este verbo corresponden a otras personas: escribías (tú), escribíamos (nosotros), escribían (ellos/ellas/ustedes).

5. What is the English meaning of 'nosotros vivíamos'?

Imperfect tense describes past actions that were ongoing or habitual, without a definite start or end. In this form, vivir with nosotros becomes vivíamos, which carries the sense of "we lived" as a continuous or repeated state in the past. In English, that translates naturally as "we used to live" or "we were living." The translation that keeps the subject as "we" and conveys the ongoing/habitual nature of the past best captures both ideas the imperfect expresses. Other options would imply a different subject or a different verb/tense, so they don't fit the same sense.

6. Conjugate bailar in the imperfect for the subject ustedes.

- A. Bailaba

Imperfect tense endings for -ar verbs: add -aba, -abas, -aba, -ábamos, -abais, -aban. The subject ustedes is treated as third-person plural in the imperfect, so you use the -aban ending: bail- + -aban = bailaban. That's why this form is correct. Bailaba would be for él/ella/usted, bailabas for tú, and bailabais for vosotros.

7. Which two imperfect forms correctly match the subject él/ella/usted for both hablar and comer?

- A. hablaba, comía**

In imperfect tense, third-person singular forms for regular verbs follow clear endings: -ar verbs use -aba, while -er/-ir verbs use -ía. So with él/ella/usted, hablar becomes hablaba (root habl-) and comer becomes comía (root com-). This pair matches the same subject for both verbs and uses the standard imperfect endings. The other options switch person or number (hablábamos = we spoke, hablabas = you spoke, comían = they spoke), so they don't fit the required subject.

8. Conjugate ser in the imperfect tense for the subject tú.

- A. éramos

In the imperfect tense, describing past states or habits, ser has forms for each subject. For tú you use eras. So, tú eras describes a past ongoing state of being, like "You were kind" or "When you were a child." An example: Cuando eras niño, te gustaba jugar en la calle. Other forms exist for other subjects: era for él/ella/usted, éramos for nosotros, erais for vosotros, eran for ellos/ellas. Note that éramos and erais carry accents, while eras does not. Also, this is different from the preterite form fue or fuiste, which would describe completed past actions rather than ongoing past states.

9. Conjugate hablar in the imperfect for the subject yo.

- A. Hablaba**

Imperfect tense is used for past actions without focusing on their start or end, often describing habits, routines, or settings. For -ar verbs like hablar, the imperfect endings are -aba, -abas, -aba, -ábamos, -abais, -aban. With the subject yo, that ending gives hablaba, meaning "I was speaking" or "I used to speak." That's why this form fits: it matches the first-person singular, describing a past action in a non-precise, ongoing or habitual sense. The other forms correspond to different subjects (tú, nosotros, ellos), so they don't match the request for yo.

10. Conjugate comer in the imperfect tense for the subject ellos.

El uso del imperfecto describe acciones habituales o en progreso en el pasado. Para verbos -er como comer, las terminaciones del imperfecto son -ía, -ías, -ía, -íamos, -íais, -ían. Con el sujeto ellos (tercera persona del plural) se añade -ían al radical. El radical de comer es com-, así que se forma comían, con la tilde en la í para marcar la pronunciación: comían. Esta forma corresponde a ellos y no a otros sujetos. Comía sería para él/ella/usted (o podría ser yo en otros contextos), comíais es para vosotros en el imperfecto, y comíamos es para nosotros.
