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Explanations

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1. When stopped behind another vehicle on a hill, how far should you stay back?

Staying at least one vehicle length back when stopped behind another vehicle on a hill is important for safety reasons. This distance allows for adequate space to maneuver or react if the vehicle in front rolls back or if you need to move in case of an emergency. In particular, on a hill, gravity can cause vehicles to roll backward, especially if the driver in front inadvertently takes their foot off the brake.
