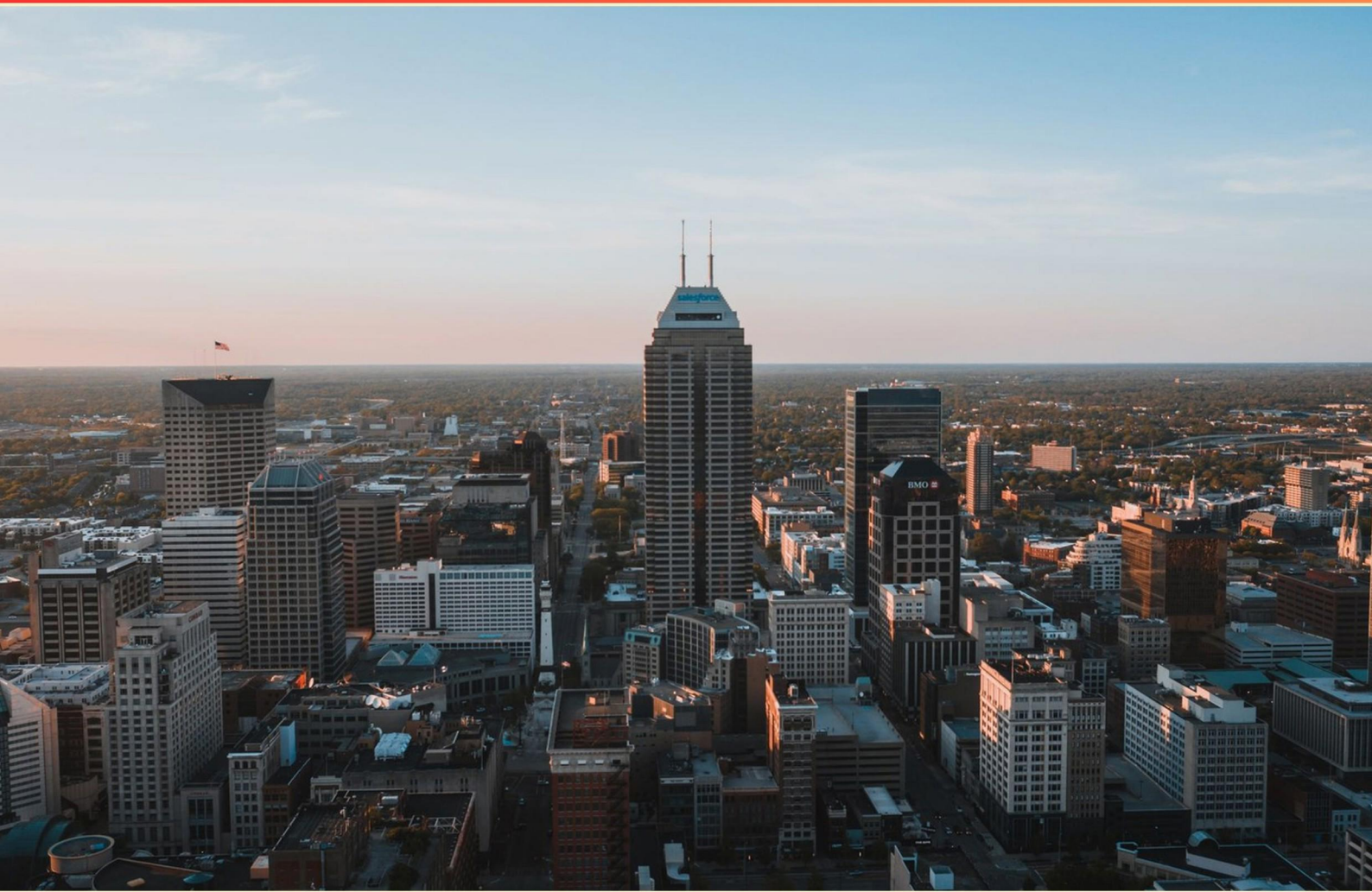

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1. Which branch of government is led by the President?

The branch of government led by the President is the Executive branch. Lincoln's legacy is most strongly tied to his commitment to ending slavery, making the correct answer clear.
