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Explanations

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1. During boarding, which Guest requires a three-point briefing?

- A. Passenger with mobility assistance
- B. Unaccompanied minor
- C. VIP passenger
- D. Passenger with special meal request

Guests who need mobility assistance require a three-point briefing to align safety and service plans for boarding, seating, and deplaning. This briefing ensures the crew knows exactly how to assist the guest and what the guest should expect, reducing confusion and enhancing safety. The three points typically cover how the escort will guide the guest to their seat or position, how the guest will access and secure any mobility equipment or seating, and what to do in an emergency or if additional help is needed during boarding or flight. This focused briefing helps the guest feel supported and informed throughout the process. Other passenger groups—such as unaccompanied minors, VIPs, or those with special meal requests—have different procedures and don't rely on this specific safety briefing.

Regulatory requirements set minimum standards that must be followed. Company policy can go beyond those minimums to reinforce protections or reflect how the organization actually operates, but it can never be less restrictive than what regulations require. If a regulation requires certain controls or protections, the policy must meet or exceed that level; it cannot permit looser rules. For example, if data protection regulations require encryption, a compliant policy might require encryption at rest and in transit and additional access controls, with potential extra safeguards. It could also impose stricter data retention or training requirements, but it cannot allow unencrypted data or weaker controls. Saying the policy always mirrors regulatory language, disregards regulations, or is unrelated to regulations would miss the practical relationship: policy is built to satisfy and, where appropriate, strengthen regulatory requirements.

3. How many ways to cut power to the galleys?

Two independent galley power feeds provide two separate points where power can be cut. Each feed has its own disconnect, so you can stop power to the galleys by switching off either one. That gives two distinct single-action ways to cut power. If the goal were to power down both galleys at once, you'd use a main disconnect or toggle both switches, which is a different scenario from the single-action options counted here.

4. When must cabin emergency equipment checks be completed?

Cabin emergency equipment checks are performed to confirm that all safety items are present, serviceable, properly stowed, and within their expiry dates before passengers board. This ensures the aircraft is ready to handle an emergency and that no items are missing or unusable. The best practice is to complete these checks before the first flight of the day and again after any crew change. Before the first flight, the aircraft has just been restocked and prepared, so a check verifies that everything is in place after overnight procedures. After a crew change, a different crew takes over, and this check ensures nothing was displaced or omitted during handover and confirms continued readiness for the upcoming flight. End-of-day procedures are not the primary focus for this particular safety check, which is about ensuring ongoing readiness for the next flight and the next crew shift.

5. What is the communication flow to confirm the cabin is secure?

This question focuses on the proper chain of communication used to confirm cabin security. The correct flow is for the first flight attendant who completes the check to report to the second flight attendant, who then relays the verified status to the Captain. This two-step handoff provides an extra verification layer and creates a clear, auditable communication trail, reducing the chance of miscommunication or missing details. If the Captain is informed directly by the first attendant or the sequence changes, it can bypass that peer check and lead to confusion or incomplete confirmation.

6. What is the primary danger after an aircraft accident?

Fire and toxic smoke are the primary dangers after an aircraft accident. A crash often ruptures fuel systems, creating an immediate risk of ignition from hot surfaces, sparks, or electrical faults. Once a fire starts, it produces dense, toxic smoke that can quickly overwhelm people, obscure visibility, and make breathing and evacuating difficult. This combination means survival relies on rapid suppression of the fire and swift, safe evacuation. Other hazards like unstable wreckage or loss of communications exist, but they are secondary to the urgent threat posed by fire and smoke. Noise-induced hearing loss is not an immediate scene hazard compared with the dangers of fire and toxic fumes.

7. To open the door from inside, you must verify the door is _____.

Opening a door from inside requires confirming that the door's security is turned off. When a door is disarmed, its locking mechanism and alarm are disabled, so you can push or pull it and pass through without triggering an alarm or dealing with a barrier. If the door is armed, it may be locked or will trigger an alarm when you try to open. If it's simply unlocked or already open, the security system may still be in a mode that requires disarming before passage. So the condition that guarantees safe, unimpeded exit is that the door is disarmed.

8. The LRBL on the A223 is at _____.

- A. R2 door area**
- B. Front aisle

Emergency equipment and storage compartments are placed near exits to support rapid evacuation and easy access for crew. On the A223, the LRBL is located at the R2 door area so it's immediately accessible from the aft-right exit during an emergency, minimizing crew travel time and avoiding obstruction of the main aisle. Other locations would either be too far from the evacuation path or sit in areas that could complicate access during an urgent evacuation, so the R2 door area is the best fit.

9. What must FAs report immediately if equipment is missing or inoperative?

- A. To the Captain**
- B. To Maintenance Control
- C. To the First Officer
- D. To Security

When a piece of equipment is missing or not working, safety decisions fall under the captain's responsibility for the flight. Flight attendants must report such issues immediately to the captain because the captain is the person in charge of the aircraft's operation, able to assess whether the flight can proceed under any applicable MEL (Minimum Equipment List) provisions, and to coordinate with maintenance and operations to arrange repairs or delays. The captain can determine if a delay, alternate plans, or other safety measures are needed. While maintenance control may be involved in arranging fixes, the initial report of the issue goes to the captain to trigger the correct safety actions.

10. FA2's station is adjacent to which door?

- A. FWD door
- B. L1

Understanding where a flight attendant's station sits helps you see which door it's closest to. FA2's station is placed near the middle left door, which allows quick access to that exit and keeps the aisle clear for passengers and crew. The forward door is at the front, and the other left doors are at different locations along the cabin, so they aren't next to FA2's station. So, the door adjacent to FA2's station is the middle left door.
