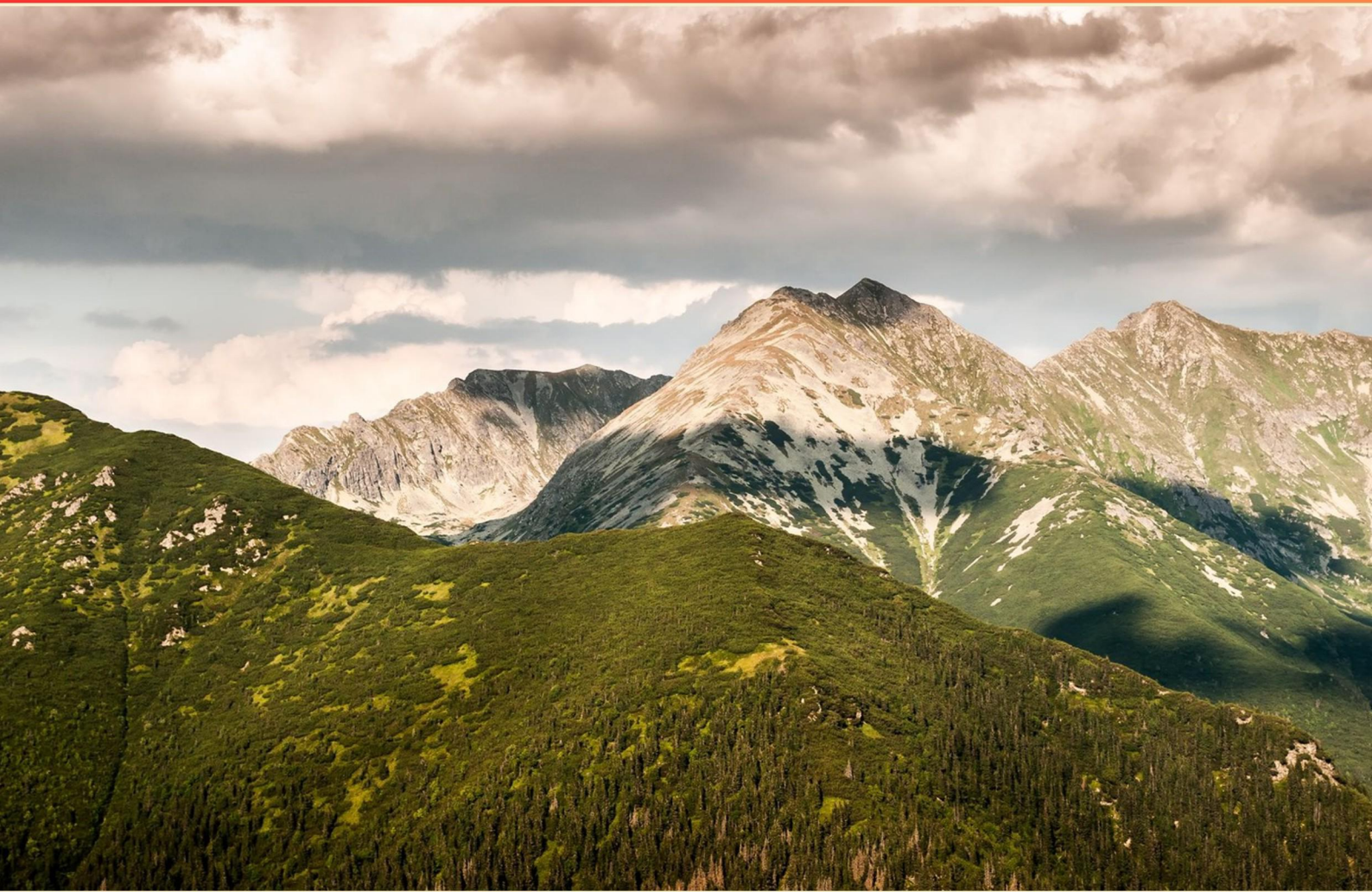

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Explanations

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1. During McCandless's second visit, what did he plan to do professionally?

- A. Work for Westerberg**
- B. Move to Alaska
- C. Travel to Salton City

The question tests how McCandless planned to finance and support his travels through practical, short-term work. On his second visit, he intended to take a job with Westerberg, using that work as a way to fund his journey and gain independence rather than continuing a long-term or fixed destination plan. Westerberg, who ran a grain operation, offered him seasonal labor, and McCandless saw this as a sensible, concrete step to stay mobile while earning money. This fits with his pattern throughout the narrative: seek real, temporary work that allows freedom and self-reliance, rather than committing to a fixed path or location. The other options—moving to Alaska immediately, traveling to Salton City, or joining a farming cooperative in Oregon—don't reflect the actual plan he had during that second visit, which was to work for Westerberg.

Using a fixed steel cable across a river provides a stable reference for watching how the water level and current change over time. The other scenarios—moving into his own place, reducing contact because of travel, or taking up painting—don't inherently involve discovering a secret or a breach of trust. They might change routines or independence, but they don't carry the same emotional blow to the parent-child bond as learning about a parent's other family.

The main idea here is that Wayne Westerberg's frustration comes from unreliable commitments. This moment shows how keeping promises, especially in a working setting, matters for trust and reliability. The other options—fighting about wages, canceling a trip, or stealing tools—did not happen in this situation.

There isn't evidence to support him taking a full-time job at McDonald's, settling immediately in Bullhead City, or writing a memoir during that period; the historical record simply isn't detailed because he stopped documenting his travels.

Understanding McCandless's early years and family life means looking at his family setup, education path, and the undercurrent of hidden tensions that shaped him. His father, Walt McCandless, worked as a space engineer, a detail that places the family in a solid, middle class, technically minded environment. His mother, Billie, is his mother in every sense, and his sister Carine is described as someone he was close to. He enrolled at Emory University on a scholarship and was a strong student, choosing not to dive into fraternities. A crucial element from his background is that his father had a secret wife and another family, a revelation that complicates the family dynamic and helps explain some of the distance Chris later felt from his past and the desire to strike out on his own. Other options don't fit because they falsely claim he dropped out of high school, or that Carine was distant, or that he had no siblings, which contradict the documented family relationships and his actual education path.

8. What memorial action did Walt take inside the door?

Memorial actions reveal how someone wants memory to live with a place. Installing a brass memorial inside the door creates a quiet, lasting tribute that is physically attached to the exact spot where the person spent time. A brass plaque inside the doorway is durable, unobtrusive, and directly ties the remembrance to the space itself, rather than drawing attention with a larger exterior feature or a living plant elsewhere. That combination—permanence, proximity to the site, and a respectful, simple mark—best fits the idea of honoring the person at the door.

9. What happened to the letters McCandless had sent before leaving Atlanta?

This question tests understanding of how mail is handled when someone leaves town without a new address. McCandless had sent letters from Atlanta, but after he left there was no forwarding address or way to deliver them. This scene highlights his abrupt departure and disconnect from his prior life.

The best description among the choices lists a broad range of symptoms—muscle pain from breakdown and fatigue, heart-related discomfort from reduced energy for the heart, increased susceptibility to illness, shortness of breath from deconditioning, mental exhaustion from cognitive strain, possible perceptual changes like hallucinations, and even mood shifts such as temporary euphoria as the brain adapts to fuel shortages. This multi-system impact mirrors how starvation unfolds in the body, not just a single symptom. The other options point to isolated issues (like headache with fever, respiratory symptoms, or nausea/vomiting) that don't reflect the material's depiction of the wide-ranging effects of prolonged starvation.
