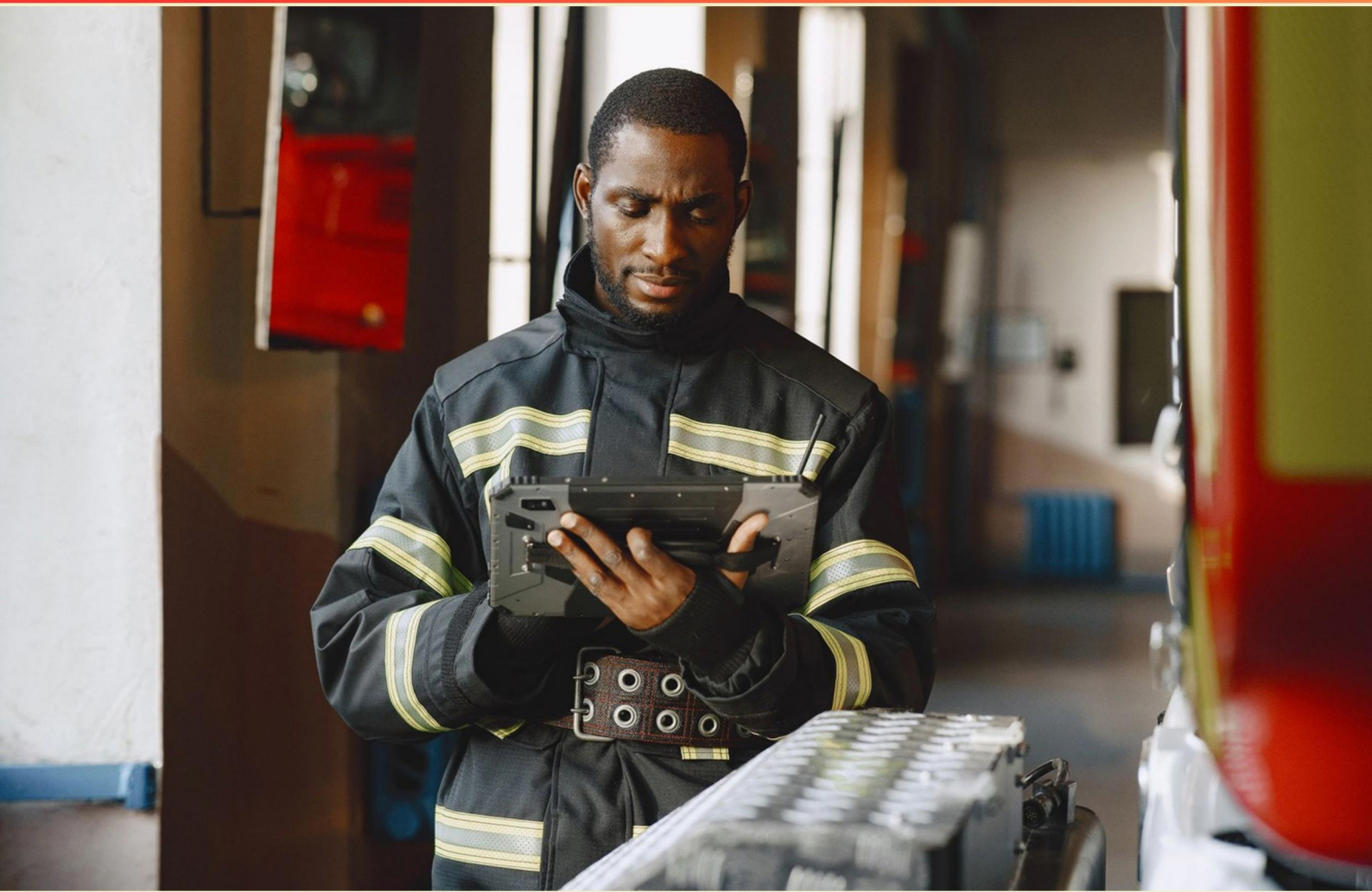

The International Organization for Standardization (ISO) is an international body that develops and publishes standards but is distinct from an agency within the United States government.
