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Explanations

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1. What was thalidomide originally used for?

Thalidomide was developed and marketed in the 1950s as a mild sedative with antiemetic properties to help pregnant women cope with morning sickness. Its primary selling point was to promote sleep and reduce nausea, not to treat pain. It is not an antibiotic, nor is it an antihistamine. This is why the intended original use is best described as a sedative (antiemetic) rather than a pain-relief medication.

The concept is the 3Rs framework used in animal research to improve welfare. The term describes applying strategies to replace animals, reduce numbers used, and refine procedures to minimize distress because the 3Rs stand for Replacement, Reduction, and Refinement. Replacement means using non-animal methods or less-sentient systems whenever possible. Reduction means designing studies so that as few animals as needed are used to get valid results, including smarter experimental design and data sharing. Refinement means altering procedures, housing, and care to lessen pain, suffering, and distress, such as better anesthesia, analgesia, and enrichment. This is the best answer because it names the overarching framework that covers all three strategies, not just listing the components. While the phrase "Reduction, Replacement, Refinement" reflects the same ideas, the standard term people use to describe this approach is "the 3Rs." This ensures procedures align with regulatory requirements and institutional policies, and that staff understand and can competently carry out the required practices. The corrective actions may include updating standard operating procedures, modifying workflows, strengthening supervision and monitoring, and validating that the changes actually reduce the risk of recurrence. Filing a patent, expanding the number of animals, or simply ignoring the issue do not address the root cause or ensure ongoing compliance; they either have no relation to the problem or would exacerbate risk and violate ethical and legal standards.

Inspections occur at least once a year. Under the Animal Welfare Act, the USDA must inspect licensees at least once during each 12-month period after licensure to verify ongoing compliance with humane care standards. This creates a minimum annual oversight cycle, ensuring monitoring beyond just renewal time. Monthly inspections would exceed the requirement, while inspections every two years would leave gaps in oversight. Inspections can be announced or unannounced, and additional checks can occur if concerns arise.

Understanding how laws regulate animal use starts with how "animal" is defined. Of course, other rules or funder policies might still apply in certain contexts, but within the AWA framework they are not regulated as "animals". In contrast, dogs, cats, and nonhuman primates are covered by the AWA, so they remain within its regulatory scope.

Ongoing checks after protocol approval to ensure welfare and compliance are described as Post-Approval Monitoring. PAM typically involves reviewing records, observing procedures, verifying training and housing conditions, monitoring for adverse events, and ensuring any deviations or amendments are reported and addressed in a timely manner. It keeps the study aligned with the approved protocol and regulatory requirements for the entire duration of the work. Other terms may convey similar ideas, but they aren't the standard label for this ongoing, post-approval activity. Post-Approval Monitoring is the recognized way to describe these continuing welfare and compliance checks.

An assurance number is a unique identifier tied to an institution's commitment to comply with the humane care and use standards for animals in research. It is assigned by the Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) as part of meeting the Public Health Service Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. Institutions that receive PHS funds must submit an Assurance to OLAW; once reviewed and approved, OLAW issues the Assurance number to that institution. This number is used to verify compliance in PHS-funded research and grant activities. It is not a regulatory fee to IACUC, a license for animal transport, or a code for IACUC membership.

The central idea here is that the Assurance is the formal pledge an institution makes to OLAW to follow the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. It documents the institution's commitment to compliance and outlines the program for animal care and use, including oversight by the IACUC, veterinary care, staff training, and facility standards. OLAW reviews and approves this Assurance, and that approval enables the institution to receive PHS funding for vertebrate animal research. It isn't about summarizing expenditures, vendor qualifications, or scheduling oversight activities—those are separate institutional processes.

Environmental enrichment aims to support welfare by giving animals opportunities to perform species-typical behaviors and to reduce stress. Providing nesting materials, tunnels, or foraging devices lets animals engage in natural activities like nesting, exploring, and foraging, which boosts their mental well-being and comfort in captivity. While aspects like diet variety or housing complexity can be part of enrichment, the core idea is enabling natural behaviors to improve welfare. Conversely, using time-pressured tasks to speed up experiments would increase stress and does not align with the purpose of enrichment.

10. What are the three Rs in laboratory animal welfare?

The three Rs guiding humane use of animals in research are Replacement, Reduction, and Refinement. Replacement means using non-animal methods or less sentient systems whenever possible, such as in vitro tests, computer models, or using tissues instead of whole animals. Reduction focuses on designing studies to obtain the needed information with fewer animals, through proper statistical planning, power analyses, and sharing controls when feasible. Refinement means altering procedures to minimize pain, distress, or suffering, including better anesthesia and analgesia, humane endpoints, improved housing, and thorough staff training. Regulation is governance and oversight, not one of the three welfare principles. Repetition is not a term used in this framework. Replace, Reduce, Refine conveys the idea in a similar spirit, but the standard wording is Replacement, Reduction, Refinement.
