One way to define social capital is the connections that individuals have with one another, whether it be through relationships, groups, or networks. Egoism, the prioritization of oneself over others, does not necessarily indicate the strength of social connections and therefore is not a suitable measure for social capital. Fiscal policy, the decisions made by government relating to taxes and spending, may indirectly impact social capital but is not a direct measure of it. Therefore, option B, social networks, is the most appropriate measure to assess social capital.
