This focus on merging key operational areas underscores the system's role as a foundational tool for effective management and decision-making within an organization.

An annual report serves as a summary of the organization's performance over the past year, highlighting achievements and financial status, but it does not specifically detail long-term physical improvements or their associated costs. Therefore, while the other options serve important functions within organizational finance, the capital budget is the most relevant document for capturing and planning for long-term physical improvements.
