Lastly, framing the Sabbath as a day for entertainment and leisure activities shifts the focus away from its sacred purpose, which is fundamentally about spiritual rejuvenation and community ties.

Psalm 148:14 speaks to the praise of His people but does not define them as elect. Isaiah 45:4 identifies Israel as God's servant and chosen, but it is more about God's selection of a nation rather than the theological concept of "Elect" as seen in the New Testament. Deuteronomy 6:25 discusses righteousness as a result of obeying God's commandments, which is an aspect of the relationship with God, but it does not reference the idea of election in the specific sense used in the context of Paul's letters. Thus, Romans 8:29 is the passage that most clearly supports the understanding of "God's Elect" within the framework of scripture, illustrating that those chosen by God are intended
