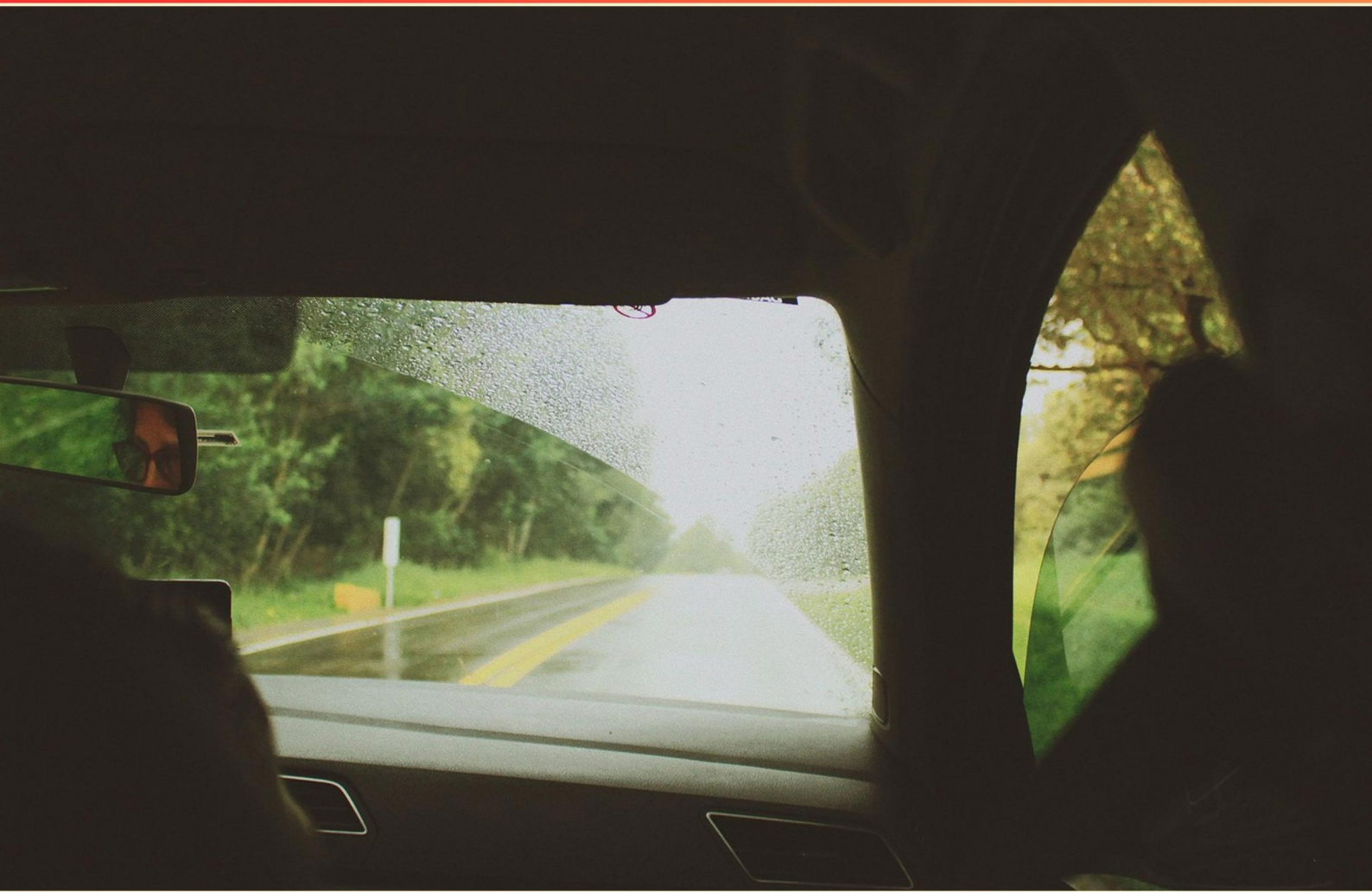

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Explanations

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1. How should drivers behave in a parking lot?
