Edge city refers to a large, mixed-use center that develops at the urban fringe, usually near highway interchanges, bringing together offices, shopping, housing, hotels, and entertainment. This creates a distinct place separate from the traditional downtown and reflects how car-oriented suburban growth can generate a recognizable hub with real functions. It's different from a single mall complex, which is just a shopping site, or from a central business district, which is the old downtown core. The idea captures why people come to a linked cluster of services and residences at the highway edge and still feel it as a single, cohesive place.

2. In environmental sociology, the focus is on which relationship?

The main idea being tested is the bidirectional relationship between humans and the environment. In environmental sociology, scholars examine how social structures, cultures, economies, and institutions shape environmental problems, and how environmental changes and resources in turn influence social life, behavior, and policy. This reciprocal influence is what makes the mutual influence of humans and the environment the best fit. Other options focus on specific policies or one-way effects (like climate impacting culture or regulation) rather than the ongoing two-way interaction between society and nature.

3. Status consistency refers to

Status consistency is about alignment across the major indicators of social class—education, occupation prestige, and income—so that a person's status moves in the same direction on all three. When someone ranks high on education, has a high-prestige job, and earns a high income, or when someone is low on all three, their status is consistent. That's why the best answer describes ranking high or low on all three dimensions. If someone were similar only in the sense of "similar levels" across dimensions but not necessarily high or low together, that wouldn't capture the idea of concordant status across factors. Likewise, changes in status over time or moving between classes describe mobility, not consistency. For example, a well-educated person with a high-status occupation and high income demonstrates status consistency at the high end.

This item tests how people view real, tangible work versus positions of authority within a hierarchy. The sentiment described—seeing one's own job as "real" work and labeling those above as "paper pushers" who are detached from daily labor—fits how the working class often defines itself. Working-class identities tend to emphasize the value and authenticity of hands on or service labor and distinguish it from managerial or executive roles that are associated with abstract paperwork and distance from production. The other groups don't fit this exact self-perception as cleanly. The middle class includes professional and white-collar roles but isn't defined by a clear, ongoing distinction between "real work" and management in the same way. The upper class is typically more aligned with wealth and power than with doing established, everyday labor. The lower class centers more on economic resources and precarious living conditions rather than a distinct ideology about the nature of work versus the office-staff above them.

5. The annihilation or attempted annihilation of a people because of their presumed race or ethnicity is known as

Genocide is the deliberate destruction of a national, ethnic, racial, or religious group, in whole or in part. The phrase "annihilation or attempted annihilation" is exactly what genocide describes, because it centers on intent to destroy a group of people based on their identity. Ethnocide refers to eroding a group's cultural identity rather than its physical destruction. Assimilation is the process by which a minority group adopts the dominant culture, often losing distinctiveness. Segregation is the enforced separation of groups, not necessarily aimed at destroying them.

6. In a traditional society, education was described as which of the following?

In traditional societies, education happens through informal means—knowledge and skills are passed on as part of daily life, within families and communities, through storytelling, observation, participation in work, and guidance from elders. This learning isn't organized as a formal school system with a set curriculum or credentials, and it isn't governed by the state. While people may learn trades or crafts by helping elders, that instruction blends into everyday activities rather than being structured as an official program. So the description that best fits is informal education.

7. Which statement best describes the relationship between income and health?

- A. Health is unaffected by income
- B. Health worsens with higher income
- C. Health fluctuates randomly with income
- D. Health improves with higher income**

Income is a major determinant of health: more income generally gives people better access to healthcare, nutritious food, safer housing, and healthier environments, while also reducing stress related to financial insecurity. These advantages tend to lead to better health outcomes, which is why the statement that health improves with higher income best describes the relationship. The other options contradict well-established patterns: health is not independent of income, it does not typically worsen with higher income, and the link is not random but shows a systematic association across populations.

8. According to diffusion of responsibility, the fewer bystanders there are, the more likely people are to help. This principle describes which pairing?

- A. More; fewer
- B. Fewer; more**
- C. Equal; none
- D. More; equal

Diffusion of responsibility shows that the more people present, the less each person feels they must help, so helping becomes less likely. When there are only a few bystanders, individuals feel more personal accountability and are more likely to intervene. The statement describes the pairing of fewer bystanders with more likelihood of helping. The other options would imply the opposite or no change, which conflicts with this pattern.

9. Which event is given as an example of discovery?

- A. Columbus discovering North America**
- B. The invention of electricity
- C. The steam engine
- D. The printing press

Discovery is about finding something that exists but isn't known to the discoverer yet. Columbus's arrival in North America fits this idea because the land existed long before, but it was unknown to Europeans until that voyage. The other items are examples of invention—creating new things or technologies through human effort (the steam engine, the printing press), or describing electricity as an invention, which isn't about uncovering something that already exists. So the best example of discovery is Columbus discovering North America.

10. Which statement about population growth rate is true?

- A. It is always positive
- B. It is calculated yearly
- C. It measures population density
- D. It can be a negative number**

Population growth rate shows how fast a population changes in size over a given period, usually expressed as a percentage per year. Because births, deaths, and migration vary, the rate can be positive when there are more births than deaths and net in-migration, zero when these factors balance, or negative when deaths and net out-migration exceed births and net in-migration. So it can be a negative number, indicating a shrinking population. The other statements don't hold universally: it isn't always positive, the interval it's calculated over isn't fixed to yearly in all cases, and it doesn't measure density (that's about how many individuals live in a given area).
