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Explanations

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1. Which term is the aviation label for UTC time widely used by pilots and controllers?

- A. Zulu Time**
- B. Taxiway
- C. Unaccompanied Minor

In aviation, time must be the same for everyone no matter where you are, so all flight plans, weather, and ATC instructions reference a single clock. That universal time is UTC, and the aviation label for it is Zulu Time. The name comes from the NATO phonetic alphabet, where Z represents zero offset from Coordinated Universal Time. So, a timestamp like 1200Z means 12:00 UTC, not local time at the departure or destination. Using Zulu time avoids confusion during cross-border operations and when daylight saving changes. Other terms in the options relate to ground routes, passenger categories, or aircraft type, not time references.

Think of the galley as the airplane's on-board kitchen where cabin crew store catering supplies and prepare snacks and beverages for inflight service. It's a dedicated area equipped with storage for meals and drinks, beverage carts or trolleys, warming ovens or warmers, a sink, and waste bins. During service, crew pull items from the galley, keep everything organized, and reload carts as needed to feed and refresh passengers. This space isn't used for passenger seating or flight-deck operations. The cabin crew rest area (on longer flights) is a separate space for crew to sleep, the cockpit equipment storage bay holds flight-deck gear, and the rear seating area is where passengers sit.

Wide-body aircraft are designed with a larger fuselage diameter that can accommodate two passenger aisles side by side, allowing more seats and greater comfort on long flights. The two-aisle cabin layout is the defining feature that sets wide-bodies apart from narrow-bodies, which use a single central aisle. A single-aisle configuration describes narrow-body planes, not wide-bodies. Engine count isn't what defines a wide-body—you can have wide-bodies with two engines (like many common models) or four-Engine wide-bodies in the past, but that's not the defining trait. A small fuselage would imply a narrow-body, not a wide-body. Therefore, the best description is a two-aisle configuration.

A pushback tug is a specialized ground tow vehicle used to push an aircraft away from the gate so it can taxi to the runway. It attaches to the aircraft's nose gear (often with a towbar) and, under the guidance of the tug operator, moves the aircraft backward and then forward to align with the taxiway. Engines are typically shut down during pushback for safety, and once the aircraft is freed and properly lined up, it starts its engines and taxis under its own power. This vehicle is specifically for moving aircraft, not for towing luggage, catering, or supplying power.

Zulu Time is the aviation term for Coordinated Universal Time (UTC). This standard is used across all flight operations to keep times consistent worldwide, regardless of local time zones or daylight saving. It isn't limited to military airspace or to flight plans alone; weather reports, air traffic control, navigation logs, and departure/arrival times all use Zulu time. Some people think it's the same as GMT, but in aviation the precise reference is UTC, and Zulu time corresponds to UTC rather than just being "roughly GMT." This universal time ensures clear, synchronized communication and coordination worldwide.

The term identifies the pilot responsible for the flight's safe operation and the final authority on all flight decisions. This role is called the Pilot in Command. The Pilot in Command has the ultimate say on how the aircraft is flown, how systems are managed, and how to handle any issues that arise during the flight. While the Captain is usually the person who holds a command rank and often serves as the Pilot in Command, the formal designation that specifically identifies who has final authority is Pilot in Command. The other terms aren't standard ways to label this responsibility in airline operations.

7. What information is typically shown on a boarding pass?

Boarding passes exist to identify you and authorize you to board a specific flight. The information that matters most for that purpose is your name, the flight number, your seat assignment, and the gate. Your name links the pass to you, the flight number identifies the exact trip, the seat shows where you'll sit, and the gate directs you to the correct boarding area. The other details listed are not needed for boarding: maintenance history is for aircraft records, meal preferences are handled separately from the boarding process, and aircraft registration or engine type are technical details not required to board.

Two-aisle layouts are a signature of wide-body aircraft, which are built for longer flights and higher passenger capacity. Having two parallel aisles allows more seats across the cabin and easier movement for passengers and crew during boarding, service, and deplaning on international routes. That greater width and capacity come with the longer-range design of wide-bodies, like the Boeing 777/787 family and Airbus A330/A350. In contrast, narrow-body planes, regional jets, and turboprops are typically smaller and use a single central aisle, reflecting their use on shorter routes and with lower overall seating.

9. What is JetBlue's loyalty program called?

Loyalty programs are branded rewards clubs that airlines offer to repeat customers. JetBlue's club goes by TrueBlue, so you earn TrueBlue points on JetBlue purchases and redeem them for flights and perks. This name is unique to JetBlue, just as SkyMiles belongs to Delta, AAdvantage to American, and Rapid Rewards to Southwest. So the correct name for JetBlue's loyalty program is TrueBlue.

10. What is Blue Basic fare?

Blue Basic is JetBlue's cheapest fare class, designed to keep the price down by placing several restrictions on what you get. The main trade-off is you don't get free advance seat selection and baggage flexibility is limited, which typically means fewer or no free checked bags and stricter rules on changes or refunds. In other words, it's the lowest fare with several limits on seating, baggage, and changes. Other options describe higher-end or different programs—such as a premium cabin experience, an extra-legroom seating option, or a loyalty program—not the basic, lowest-cost fare with its typical restrictions.
