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Explanations

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1. What is the largest prime factor of 2008?

- A. 199
- B. 223
- C. 251
- D. 257

This question tests how to break a number down into prime factors and pick the largest one. Start by pulling out the smallest prime factor. Because 2008 is even, divide by 2 repeatedly: $2008 = 2 \times 1004$, and $1004 = 2 \times 502$, and $502 = 2 \times 251$. What remains after removing all factors of 2 is 251. Now, 251 has no divisors among the primes up to its square root, so it is prime. Therefore the prime factorization is $2^3 \times 251$, and the largest prime factor is 251. The other choices aren't factors of 2008, so they can't be the prime factors.

2. Which island is the second largest in the West Indies?

- A. Jamaica
- B. Cuba
- C. Puerto Rico
- D. Hispaniola

This question tests understanding of how islands in the West Indies are ranked by land area. To answer, you compare how much surface each island covers. The largest Caribbean island is Cuba. The second-largest is Hispaniola, the island shared by Haiti and the Dominican Republic, with a land area around 76,000 square kilometers. Jamaica and Puerto Rico are much smaller, at roughly 11,000 and 9,000 square kilometers, respectively. That bigger size is why Hispaniola occupies the second spot in the size ranking, making it the correct choice.

3. What is the capital city of Jordan?

- A. Jordan City
- B. Petra
- C. Aqaba
- D. Amman

A capital city is the main political center of a country, where the government is seated and national leadership operates. For Jordan, that role is filled by Amman, which serves as the administrative heart of the country. Petra is famous as an ancient city and archaeological site, not the current capital. Aqaba is a coastal port city on the Red Sea. There isn't a real city named Jordan City as the capital. So Amman is the correct choice because it is the country's capital and administrative center.

4. Which Hindu deity is known as 'The Destroyer'?

- A. Vishnu
- B. Shiva**
- C. Brahma
- D. Krishna

In Hinduism, the force that dissolves old forms to make way for new creation is attributed to a specific deity. This deity is Shiva, the destroyer. His role isn't about simple annihilation; it's about transformation—clearing away the old and worn-out to allow renewal and renewed life to arise. This fits into the broader idea of cosmic cycles where creation, preservation, and destruction work together. Shiva's symbols, like the third eye that sees through illusion and the fiery energy of his dance, embody this power of dissolution that enables new beginnings. In contrast, Vishnu is the preserver who sustains the universe, and Brahma is the creator; Krishna is an avatar of Vishnu. So the destroyer is Shiva.

5. Which Shakespeare play ends with Dover and the Earl of Gloucester in a troubled state?

- A. King Lear**
- B. Macbeth
- C. Othello
- D. Hamlet

The ending in this question is about a tragedy where two key figures—Lear and the Earl of Gloucester—are left in a deeply troubled state, highlighting how the play's moral order collapses. In King Lear, the closest to a cathartic closure comes only after Lear's mind is shattered by filial ingratitude and loss, and Gloucester's body and expectations are brutalized by betrayal and blindness. The final scenes underscore a world stripped of power and comfort, with both main characters bearing the weight of suffering as the curtain falls. The other Shakespeare plays listed don't bring these two figures together in their endings: Macbeth ends with a toppled tyrant and a fragile restoration, Othello ends in jealous tragedy and revenge, and Hamlet ends with a grim, fatal culmination for several characters but not the same pair and mood as Lear's finale. So, the play that fits the description is King Lear.

6. Which fundamental relationship does $e^{i\pi}$ illustrate a special case of?

- A. Pythagorean theorem
- B. Euler's formula**

At the heart is Euler's formula, which links complex exponentials to trigonometric functions. For any real angle θ , $e^{i\theta}$ equals $\cos \theta$ plus $i \sin \theta$. Setting $\theta = \pi$ gives $e^{i\pi} = \cos \pi + i \sin \pi = -1$, so the exponential at angle π lands exactly at -1 on the real axis. This shows how the exponential function encodes rotation on the complex plane, precisely what Euler's formula describes. De Moivre's theorem is related and follows from this idea when you raise the exponential to a power, but the direct relationship shown by $e^{i\pi}$ is Euler's formula. The other concepts don't describe this specific bridge between exponential form and circular trigonometry.

7. What is the compound adjective used to describe letters that are not capital letters?

Lowercase is the term used to describe letters that are not capital letters. It's a compound adjective formed from "lower" and "case," and it describes the small letters in a font. In typography, you contrast lowercase with uppercase, which are the capital letters. "Capitalized" refers to making the first letter of a word uppercase, not to the overall set of letters, and "smallcase" isn't a standard term.

8. Which Greek god is associated with vegetation, being 'twice born' through his mother and then his father's thigh, and honored in a great Athens festival that led to Greek tragedy and comedy?

Dionysus is the god of vegetation, wine, and ritual renewal, so a name tied to growing plants and the life force of communities fits the clue about vegetation. A famous myth for him is that he is "twice born": his mother Semele dies, but Zeus saves the unborn child by sewing him into his thigh, from which he is born again. This miraculous birth emphasizes renewal and vitality, central to his nature as a god who brings life and fertility. The great Athens festival dedicated to him—the City or Great Dionysia—gave rise to Greek theater, with tragedies and comedies performed in his honor. That connection to dramatic performance is why this festival is linked to the development of Greek drama, aligning perfectly with the clue about the festival that led to tragedy and comedy. Demeter is associated with agriculture, but not with a double birth or the theater festival; Zeus is a sky god and progenitor of many figures, not the specific double-birth icon here; Hermes is a different deity altogether.

9. Which island nation extends along the Pacific coast of Asia, consisting of four main islands and many smaller ones, with Mt. Fuji as its highest peak?

- A. Philippines
- B. Indonesia
- C. Japan**
- D. New Zealand

Japan fits this description because it sits along the Pacific coast of Asia and is an island nation made up of four main islands—Honshu, Hokkaido, Kyushu, and Shikoku—with many smaller ones. Mount Fuji, a famous stratovolcano near Tokyo, is the highest peak in the country at about 3,776 meters. The other options don't match this combination of four primary islands and Mount Fuji, so they aren't correct.

10. Which Tolkien work features the Battle of the Pelennor Fields and won the Best Picture Oscar?

- A. The Hobbit: An Unexpected Journey
- B. Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King**
- C. The Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers
- D. The Silmarillion

The Battle of the Pelennor Fields occurs in The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King, the final film in Peter Jackson's adaptation of Tolkien's saga. This movie delivers the climactic defense of Minas Tirith against Sauron's forces, making it the story moment most closely associated with that battle. It also earned the Best Picture Oscar, sweeping the top award at the Academy Awards. The other options don't feature this specific battle: The Hobbit follows a separate prequel tale; The Two Towers covers different battles like Helm's Deep; The Silmarillion is a mythology collection and isn't a film that won Best Picture. So this film uniquely matches both parts of the question.
