It specifies not only the goal—to eject enemy forces and restore territorial integrity—but also the methods to achieve this goal, such as direct attacks and interdiction. This provides a vivid picture of the joint air operation intended and the specifics of what the JFACC will do. In contrast, the other options lack the same level of detail or specificity. Therefore, they do not fulfill the criteria for a course of action statement as effectively as the selected answer does.*

Operational metrics, therefore, provide the critical metrics required for assessing effectiveness and guiding future planning in air operations.*

The other options, while related to aspects of planning, do not directly address the primary function of these measures in relation to mission evaluation. Compliance with regulations pertains more to adherence to established guidelines than to the effectiveness of mission execution. Resource allocation may be influenced by performance measures, but it is not the primary reason for their development. Streamlined communication is essential for staff operations, but it does not capture the essence of evaluation concerning the mission's success and effectiveness.*
