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Explanations

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1. Which of the following is NOT one of the three interrelated dimensions?

- A. Temporal
- B. Physical
- C. Informational
- D. Cognitive

The main idea here is recognizing the three interrelated dimensions used to describe how effects propagate across the battlespace: physical, informational, and cognitive. These three are tightly linked—physical actions produce and disrupt information flows, which in turn shape how people perceive, understand, and decide, driving further physical actions. The timing or tempo of operations (temporal) affects how quickly and in what order those actions unfold, but it isn't itself categorized as one of the three dimensions. Therefore, temporal is the element that does not belong to the set of the three interrelated dimensions.

2. Which element is described as the MACCS entity equivalent to the TACS CRC?

The MACCS element that mirrors the TACS Control and Reporting Center is the Tactical Air Operations Center. Both serve as the air control hub at the tactical level, integrating sensor data, maintaining the air picture, and directing and coordinating air operations in the battlespace. This center links with higher echelons and other forces to ensure proper deconfliction, target prioritization, and asset tasking. The other options have different primary roles: Joint Fires Support coordination centers focus on land-fire fires coordination rather than air control; the other components are oriented to different aspects of fires or air defense management and do not perform the CRC's air-control and reporting function in MACCS.

NSC membership is defined in law, separating who must be at the table from who can attend by invitation. The statutory members are the President, the Vice President, and the secretaries of State, Defense, the Treasury, and Energy. That makes the statement listing those roles as statutory members true—the group specified are indeed the mandatory participants. The National Security Advisor, while central to NSC coordination and who often attends meetings, is not a statutory member. This role is an appointed position that leads the NSC staff and helps organize NSC discussions, but it isn't created by statute as an official member of the council. Similarly, the Vice President and the Secretary of Defense are included in the statutory roster, so claims that either is not a member would be incorrect.

Providing a balanced and scalable fires capability across an assigned area requires a configuration that can mass fires when needed, cover multiple sectors, and sustain operations. The standard rule assigns three MLRS/HIMARS battalions to each FAB. This arrangement gives enough launcher capacity to mass effects on prioritized targets or sectors while keeping a reserve available to respond to unfolding situations. It also supports manageable logistics, maintenance, and command-and-control, ensuring fires can be shifted quickly between sectors as the situation evolves. Fewer battalions would limit the ability to mass fires and sustain tempo, while more would strain ammunition, maintenance, and coordination. Therefore, three battalions per FAB is the best allocation.

Airspace management in joint operations is guided by three key documents that establish how airspace is planned, controlled, and defended. The Airspace Control Plan sets the overall approach for controlling airspace during the operation, defining responsibilities, sectors, and coordination methods. The Area Air Defense Plan focuses on defending the airspace within a specific area, detailing defense procedures, engagement criteria, and how air defense assets integrate with other forces. The Airspace Control Order translates the plan into actionable instructions for airspace users, providing the real-time or near-term restrictions, permissions, and procedures that must be followed. Together, these three documents cover the planning framework (ACP), the defense and deconfliction aspects (AADP), and the execution details (ACO). The Air Operations Center is a command node, not a document, and an ADO isn't a standard airspace document in this context, so they don't fit the trio that governs airspace.

Joint ACMs are standardized airspace control measures that shape how airspace is used during operations to protect forces and ensure deconfliction during fires. High-Density Airspace Control Zone, Restricted Operating Zone, and Special Activity Airspace are all established mechanisms with published procedures, boundaries, and coordination responsibilities that the services routinely rely on in joint operations. A Flight Restriction Zone, by contrast, is a term more aligned with civil aviation restrictions and does not carry the same joint-service doctrine, procedures, or airspace coordination framework used to support military fires. Because it lacks those standardized joint procedures, it isn't considered a commonly accepted joint ACM.

The basic allocation rule assigns a single FAB to each Corps/JTF/Senior army HQ. This provides a dedicated field artillery coordination and fire-support planning asset at the higher echelon to synchronize fires across subordinate units and any joint or multinational forces under that HQ. Having more than one would duplicate capability at a level meant for centralized coordination, while allocating one per Brigade would misplace the asset at a lower level where it's not intended to manage cross-unit fires. So, one FAB per Corps/JTF/Senior army HQ is the correct allocation.

8. Which description best captures the SOLE's mission?

The essential idea is how the SOLE integrates with the JAOC to coordinate, deconflict, and integrate SOF missions with air operations to prevent fratricide. Having SOLE reps in the C/JAOC ensures planners understand SOF capabilities and constraints and can align SOF actions with air missions, airspace, and targeting plans. This liaison role bridges SOF and air power, enabling real-time coordination, risk assessment, and synchronization so that SOF activities don't unintentionally conflict with or endanger air operations. The other options describe functions outside that liaison and integration focus—coordinating conventional air interdiction, developing strategic SOF doctrine, or providing medical support—so they don't capture the mission of embedding in the JAOC to prevent fratricide.

9. What is the primary output of the TET team?

The main thing this item tests is what output the Targeting Effects Team produces during targeting. The TET's primary result is the draft Joint Integrated Priority Target List, which collects target nominations, assigns priorities, and describes the intended effects. This draft provides a common, actionable targeting framework for all components to plan and execute against. It isn't the weather briefing or an operational risk assessment, which are produced by other teams and processes. It also isn't the Final ATO, which comes later from broader air planning and includes inputs from multiple sources; the TET's direct deliverable is the draft JIPTL that guides subsequent targeting decisions.

10. Level at which OPCON can be exercised?

OPCON gives a commander the authority to perform those operational tasks necessary to conduct and sustain military operations with assigned forces. That authority is not confined to the top strategic level; a Combatant Commander can delegate OPCON to subordinate commanders for a given operation. Because OPCON operates at the operational level, it can be exercised at any echelon that is at or below the Combatant Commander—ranging from theater-level commands down to Joint Task Force or component-level commands directing specific missions. The important point is that OPCON stays within the commander's geographic or functional theater and can be transferred to those below the Combatant Commander to execute tasks, reallocate forces, and direct actions as needed, until the operation ends or authority is withdrawn. This is why the correct understanding is that OPCON can be exercised at any level at or below the Combatant Commander.
