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Explanations

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1. Which description best matches the setting where Kafka stays during these events?

- A. A city apartment
- B. A mountain lodge
- C. A cottage in the woods**
- D. A riverside cabin

The setting being described focuses on isolation and quiet retreat, which is why a cottage in the woods fits best. Kafka withdraws from his everyday life and seeks a private, tranquil space where he can think, heal, and confront what's driving his journey. The woods carry a sense of solitude and mystery that matches the mood and events as he tries to carve out his own path away from the city and its distractions. A city apartment would feel crowded and connected to his former life, not the escape the story aims for. A mountain lodge suggests a different kind of remote, rugged escape with a harsher, higher-altitude vibe that doesn't align with the specific atmosphere of his stay. A riverside cabin implies proximity to water and a different set of images and moods; the woods better capture the secluded, contemplative tone the events rely on.

Johnny Walker embodies a dangerous, otherworldly force in Murakami's world, and this scene puts Nakata in a moral crossroads. Nakata has a simple, almost innocent sense of right and wrong, plus a rare ability to interact with the world in unusual ways. When Johnny Walker directly asks Nakata to kill him, it forces Nakata to confront a life-and-death choice and tests the limits—and the responsibility—of his power. This moment is a clear test of what Nakata is willing to do and what it means to intervene in someone else's fate, which is why this figure is the one who makes that specific request. The other characters—Oshima, Kafka, and Crow—drive different parts of the story and do not pose that kind of direct, life-ending proposition to Nakata.

5. What word completes Oshima's marginal note about responsibility?

Imagination underpins responsibility. In Oshima's marginal note, taking responsibility isn't just about doing what's required or facing danger; it hinges on the ability to envision the consequences of your actions and understand how they affect others. That proactive, empathetic foresight is what makes responsibility meaningful in Murakami's world. Courage is about bravery in the moment, which can be part of responsible action but isn't the whole story. Duty suggests obligation, but it doesn't by itself entail considering impact or other viewpoints. Memory focuses on what has occurred, not on guiding present or future choices. Imagination uniquely connects action to the broader moral landscape, explaining why it completes the marginal note.

6. Which name correctly identifies the woods surrounding Oshima's cabin?

Geographic setting matters because it grounds the scene and shapes mood. The woods surrounding Oshima's cabin are described as Kochi woods, tying the setting to Kochi Prefecture on Shikoku Island. That specific regional framing informs the atmosphere—lush, secluded forests that contribute to the novel's sense of isolation and introspection. The other regions—Kyoto, Hokkaido, or near Mount Fuji—would imply different climates, landscapes, and cultural cues that don't align with the described scene. So the Kochi woods is the correct identification.

7. What did the teacher bring the children into the woods to pick on the day they passed out?

The idea being tested is recalling a specific detail about what the teacher had the children pick in the woods on the day they passed out. Mushrooms fit best because they are a distinctive, memorable foraging item that also links to the dramatic moment of passing out—mushrooms have the potential to cause poisoning or dizziness, which helps explain why they fainted. Leaves or acorns are more ordinary foraging items and wouldn't as neatly connect to the incident, while fallen berries could be dangerous but don't align as strongly with the narrative cue of the children fainting after a foraging outing. So picking mushrooms is the most fitting detail for that scene.

8. Who prophesies that fish will fall from the sky?

Nakata is the character whose nature and abilities are tied to magic-sign events in the story. He lives with a simple, open mind and a unique supernatural connection—he can understand and communicate with cats and is linked to omens and strange happenings in the world around him. The moment when fish fall from the sky appears as one of these extraordinary signs influenced by his presence, making him the one who prophesies or signals this improbable event. The other characters—Oshima, Mrs. Saeki, and Johnny Walker—play different roles and don't carry the same association with omens or miracles, so Nakata is the best match for this prophecy.

9. On the day fish fall from the sky, what is the profession of the artist who is found dead in his home?

- A. Painter
- B. Poet

- D. Sculptor**

The main idea here is to identify the artist's craft as it's presented in the scene. On that day, the artist is described through his work—he shapes material into forms—so his profession is sculptor. This fits because sculpture is about turning raw material into tangible, three-dimensional figures, which complements the surreal event of fish falling from the sky by grounding the character in a physical, crafted discipline. The other choices describe different art forms, which the scene does not attribute to him, so they don't fit the described detail.

10. Which character is described as a writer by occupation?

A. Natsume Soseki

B. Kafka

C. Oshima

D. Nakata

The key idea here is recognizing who is described as having a writer by occupation. Within Kafka on the Shore, a character named Natsume Soseki is presented specifically as a writer, aligning with the real-life novelist's identity. The other figures have different roles—Kafka is the boy protagonist, Oshima is a librarian, and Nakata is a simple elder with unusual abilities. So, the best answer is the one that directly matches the occupation clue: Natsume Soseki.
