In this context, while it might seem that refills could be allowed because of the nature of PRN and ad lib, regulatory guidelines typically dictate that if a prescription indicates usage on an as-needed basis, it often limits the ability for refills. This is because the need for the medication may vary significantly from patient to patient, and the prescriber may want to monitor the patient's condition carefully before approving further supplies of the medication. Thus, the dose and frequency being dictated as PRN and ad lib can lead to a situation where refills being permitted is not applicable, ensuring that there is close oversight of how the medication is utilized. This helps prevent misuse or overages which could occur if refills were allowed under such broad directives. Therefore, no refills are typically allowed under these conditions.

Using animal products without proper oversight increases the risk of adverse reactions, and therefore, understanding the nuances of regulation is crucial in determining the safety of using such products in humans.
