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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which term describes the process of creating and organizing government within a geographic area?**

- A. Structure**

Creating and organizing government within a geographic area is about state building. This term covers establishing political institutions, laws, and the authority needed to govern a territory, including forming a government, defining sovereignty, and building the administrative systems that run a country or region. It goes beyond where people live or how space is arranged, by focusing on how governance is created and organized to provide services, maintain order, and interact with other states. Settlement focuses on population and communities, spatial deals with location and distribution, and structure is a broad term that doesn't specifically capture the process of forming government within borders.

A place where people have built homes or shelters to live, whether for the long term or temporarily, is best described as a human settlement. Habitat refers to the natural environment where organisms live, not specifically to human-built living spaces. Settlement pattern describes how these living places are arranged in an area (clustered, dispersed, linear), not what the places are. Community centers on the people and their social connections, rather than the physical housing. So the correct term highlights the built environment where people reside.

Authority is the term for when someone or an organization has legitimate power to make decisions and guide actions in a particular field, and is trusted for their knowledge or expertise. This combination of formal power, control, and recognized expertise is what makes them an authority in that area. Influence is about shaping opinions, not necessarily possessing formal power or demonstrated expertise. Jurisdiction refers to the scope of power—where or over what it applies—without implying specialized knowledge. Power alone is just the capability to act, not the accepted expertise or legitimate role that comes with authority. So, the best fit for someone with power, control, and knowledge in a specific area is authority.

This item tests what a resource means in social studies. A resource is something that can be drawn on when needed to meet goals or needs—like money, assets, or supplies. When we talk about the collective wealth of a county, we mean its resources: the financial resources and other assets the county can use to fund services, infrastructure, and programs. The other options don't fit this idea. Regions of the World refers to geographic areas, rights are legal entitlements, and Renaissance is a historical period. So the term that best captures both a source of supply or aid and the county's overall wealth is resources.

Judicial review is the process by which courts examine actions taken by the legislative and executive branches to see whether they violate the Constitution. This power acts as a check in the system of checks and balances, allowing the judiciary to strike down laws or orders that overstep constitutional authority or infringe rights. This helps maintain limits on government power and protects individual rights. For example, a court might rule that a law violates free speech protections, rendering it unconstitutional. The other options don't fit because the judicial branch refers to the branch itself, not the review process; labor is unrelated to government structure; and landforms are about geography.

Establishing a stable or permanent home or community is about forming a place where people intend to live long-term. The term that captures both the act and the result is settlement, referring to a community built by people who decide to live in a location and establish homes, farms, and infrastructure there. Source points to where something begins, not the act of forming a home. Spatial deals with space or location, not the process of creating a lasting community. Supply is about goods and resources available. So settlement best fits the idea of creating a lasting home and community.

The key idea here is ownership and control. Organizations not under government control are run by private individuals or private entities rather than by the government. That makes private institutions the best fit, because they are owned and operated by private people or companies, outside the state's day-to-day management. Public institutions are controlled by the government, funded by taxpayers, and operated as part of the public sector, so they aren't the right fit for "not under government control." Nonprofit organizations are often private in ownership and not-for-profit, but their status isn't about control alone; some nonprofits can receive government funding or oversight, so they aren't as direct a match for the idea of being outside government control. The private sector describes the broader realm of private economic activity, not a specific type of organization, so it's less precise for naming an organization category.

The main idea here is creating the governing framework that lets a geographic area function as a political community. State-building specifically describes developing the political body of a territory: establishing government institutions, laws, administrative systems, security, and legitimacy so the area can govern itself and interact with other states. It's about turning a place into a functioning political entity with structure, authority, and public services. Structure is a more general term that can refer to any organization or arrangement, not necessarily the development of political institutions. Settlement refers to where people live and communities form, which isn't about building government. Supply centers on resources and provisioning, not on governance.

The idea here is about services—the work and systems that help people meet daily needs. Public services can also include things like schools and emergency services, but the common thread is that they are the supports and infrastructure people rely on every day. The other terms describe places or groups (settlement = a place where people live; Silk Road = an ancient trade route; society = a group of people living together), not the ongoing help and systems that meet daily needs.

Dividing government powers across separate branches is about preventing one part of government from gaining too much control. This arrangement, called separation of powers, assigns distinct duties to each branch: the legislature makes laws, the executive carries them out, and the judiciary interprets and applies them. By having these branches operate independently and with checks on each other, no single group can dominate. For example, laws can be passed by the legislature, but the president can veto, and the courts can review laws to ensure they're constitutional. This structural design—three branches with mutual oversight—embodies the idea of separation of powers. The other terms don't fit: a rule is just a general guideline, the Senate is only one part of the legislature, and secondary sources are about analyzing past events, not describing how government is organized to limit power.
