This power ensures that the President does not have unilateral control over legislation and that Congress can assert its authority in the legislative process. The ability to override a veto exemplifies the framers' intent to prevent any one branch of government from becoming too powerful. This balance is fundamental to maintaining democratic governance and reflects the fundamental principle that no single body can dominate the lawmaking process. This dynamic between Congress and the President reinforces the collaborative nature of American governance, where different branches must work together while also holding each other accountable.
