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Explanations

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1. In what year did man first land on the Moon?

- A. 1959

The correct answer is 1969, as this marks the year when Apollo 11, the first crewed mission to land on the Moon, successfully achieved its historic landing. On July 20, 1969, astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin descended onto the lunar surface, with Armstrong famously declaring, "That's one small step for [a] man, one giant leap for mankind." This event was a significant milestone in human space exploration, showcasing advances in technology and human ingenuity. The other years listed do not correspond with any crewed lunar landing missions. For instance, 1959 was the year when the Soviet spacecraft Luna 1 was launched, marking an early milestone in space exploration, but it did not involve humans landing on the Moon. The years 1979 and 1989 are also not relevant to lunar landings, as no manned missions occurred during those years. Thus, 1969 stands out as the landmark year for human achievement in landing on the Moon.

Electric current is measured in amperes (often abbreviated as "amps"). The ampere is a fundamental unit in the International System of Units (SI) and represents the flow of electric charge. When one ampere of current flows through a conductor, it means that one coulomb of charge is passing through that point in the circuit per second. To understand the other units: volts measure electric potential or voltage, watts measure electrical power (the rate at which energy is used or generated), and ohms measure resistance in a circuit. Each of these units plays a different role in understanding electricity, but when specifically discussing the flow of electric current, amperes is the appropriate measurement.

3. What mountain range was formed by the collision of the Eurasian and Indo-Australian plates?

The Himalayas were formed by the collision of the Eurasian and Indo-Australian tectonic plates around 50 million years ago. This geological event is significant because it illustrates the process of plate tectonics and how the Earth's surface is shaped over time. As these two massive plates pushed against each other, the intense pressure caused the land to buckle and fold, leading to the rise of the Himalayas, which are now among the tallest mountains in the world, including Mount Everest. This mountain range continues to grow today as the plates are still moving, highlighting the dynamic nature of our planet's crust. The other mountain ranges listed were formed through different geological processes and at distinct locations involving other tectonic plates, which is why they are not the correct answer. The Rockies, for instance, were primarily formed by the subduction of the oceanic plates beneath the North American plate, while the Andes arose from the collision between the Nazca and South American plates. The Alps were primarily formed from the collision of the African and Eurasian plates.

The Indonesian state located on Borneo Island is Kalimantan. Borneo is the third-largest island in the world, and it is shared by three countries—Indonesia, Malaysia, and Brunei. This area is known for its rich biodiversity, tropical rainforests, and significant indigenous cultures. Sumatra, Java, and Sulawesi are all distinct islands in Indonesia, each with their own geographical and cultural characteristics. Sumatra lies to the west of Borneo and is known for its rugged terrain and volcanic activity. Java, the most populous island in Indonesia, is located to the south of Borneo and is the political and economic center of the country. Sulawesi, located to the east of Borneo, is known for its unique shape and diverse marine life. Thus, Kalimantan is the only choice that specifically refers to the Indonesian part of Borneo Island.

Other figures listed, such as Harriet Quimby, were indeed pioneers in aviation; Quimby became the first woman in the world to earn a pilot's license in 1911 but did not fly across the Atlantic. Bessie Coleman broke barriers as the first African American woman to earn a pilot's license, and Jacqueline Cochran was a prominent aviator known for her speed records and contributions during World War II, but neither of them accomplished the solo Atlantic crossing that Earhart did.

Granite, although a tough and durable rock composed mainly of quartz and feldspar, does not match the hardness of diamonds, as it is primarily known for its compressive strength rather than its scratch resistance.

Understanding India's location helps grasp its role in global economics, politics, and cultural exchanges on the Asian continent.

Asia is home to various deserts, like the Gobi and the Thar, but not the Sahara. North America has deserts like the Mojave and the Sonoran, which are distinct from the Sahara. Australia is known for its deserts such as the Great Victoria Desert and the Simpson Desert, again, none of which are the Sahara. Thus, understanding that the Sahara is uniquely situated within the African continent helps clarify why this option is the correct one.

10. Who was the President of the United States that abolished slavery?

Abraham Lincoln was the President of the United States who is widely credited with abolishing slavery through his leadership during the Civil War and the issuance of the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863. This landmark document declared that all enslaved people in Confederate-held territory were to be set free, marking a significant step toward the ultimate abolition of slavery in the United States. Lincoln's efforts culminated in the passage of the 13th Amendment to the Constitution in 1865, which formally abolished slavery throughout the country. In contrast, George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, while being prominent figures in early American history and both owning enslaved individuals, did not take action to abolish slavery during their presidencies. Andrew Johnson, who succeeded Lincoln, faced the challenge of Reconstruction but did not focus on the abolition of slavery as Lincoln did, as it was already established by the time he took office. This historical context emphasizes Lincoln's crucial role in ending the practice of slavery in America.
