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Explanations

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1. How should you treat hypothermia?

- A. Remove clothing and air exposure
- B. Cover patient in blanket/jacket**
- C. Administer warm IV fluids
- D. Apply heat packs to limbs

Conserving body heat is the key idea when treating hypothermia. The best immediate action is to wrap the person in a dry blanket or jacket to insulate them, reduce radiant and wind-driven heat loss, and support gradual rewarming of the core. This simple step safely stabilizes core temperature and buys time for further care. Other options have drawbacks: removing clothing in a cold environment can increase heat loss; warming limbs with heat packs can cause uneven warming or tissue injury and may worsen core cooling; warm IV fluids are a medical treatment that should be used in a controlled setting with monitoring. By prioritizing insulation, you keep the core warmer and set up safer conditions for additional treatment.

2. Which option represents Non-US military?

It's about identifying labels for groups by both status (military vs civilian) and geography (US vs non-US). The term Non-US military refers to armed forces that are not part of the United States, so it matches both dimensions exactly. The other options mix in the wrong combination: US military points to United States forces, US civilian is non-military, and Non-US civilian refers to non-military people outside the US. So the choice that explicitly states Non-US military is the correct one.

3. In a car during reveille/retreat, what should you do?

Observing these bugle calls is about showing respect and giving full attention during an important ceremonial moment. When you're in a car, the proper action is to pull over to the side of the road and stop, then have everyone inside sit quietly at attention until the last note finishes. This pauses traffic safely and signals your recognition of the ceremony, keeping distractions to a minimum. Honking, continuing to drive, or turning on the radio would disrupt the moment and be disrespectful to others observing the tradition. The key idea is to briefly pause and remain quiet and attentive for the duration of the call.

4. When should the lower-ranking member initiate the salute?

Saluting is a mutual expression of respect that works best when timed so the higher-ranking officer can notice the gesture and return it. The lower-ranking member should initiate the salute at a moment that allows the officer to see it and acknowledge it without disruption. If you wait until the officer has finished speaking, or you salute too late or too early, the exchange loses its smooth, respectful flow. The proper timing is to begin in time for the higher-ranking officer to observe and return the salute, ensuring both sides acknowledge each other properly.

PLANORD directs the development of the mission plan before any execution orders are issued. It signals the start of deliberate planning, guiding staffs to begin analysis, concept development, and the outlining of a coordinated approach. An OPORD is the formal directive that tells units how to execute the mission, so PLANORD sits earlier in the sequence as the trigger to create the plan itself. It isn't merely a preliminary notice nor an update to a current plan; its purpose is to drive the creation of the plan before execution is laid out. The other descriptions describe a notice, an execution directive, or an update, which do not match what PLANORD is meant to do.

6. Which step involves communicating with medical personnel about aid provided?

After you've provided aid in the field, the next vital move is to inform the medical team about what you did. This direct communication gives the medics a clear, real-time picture of the care already given—what wounds were addressed, what supplies or medications were used, and how the casualty is currently responding. With that handoff, they can plan the next steps, adjust treatment if needed, and ensure continuity of care as the casualty moves through the medical chain. The other steps have different roles: getting the first aid kit is about having the right tools, checking for other injuries is part of the initial assessment, and documenting the aid on the TCCC Card records what was done but doesn't replace the need to verbally communicate with medical personnel for proper handoff.

In a formation, the salute is given by the most senior person present. This reflects how respect and recognition are shown through the unit's leadership: the highest-ranking individual represents the entire formation. The rest of the members don't individually salute to maintain order and discipline; the senior member handles the salute on behalf of everyone in the group, and the higher-ranking officer may return it if appropriate.

8. In geography, which ocean is located on the east coast of the United States?

The ocean on the east coast of the United States is the Atlantic Ocean. This ocean lies between North America and Europe/Africa, forming the coastline from Maine down to Florida. The Pacific is on the west coast, the Arctic Ocean is up near the far north, and the Indian Ocean lies far to the south and east of Africa and Asia, not along the U.S. coast. The Atlantic is the correct one.

9. The symbol Na stands for which element?

- A. Nitrogen
- B. Sodium**
- C. Chlorine
- D. Potassium

In chemistry, symbols are abbreviations for elements, often derived from their Latin names. Na comes from Natrium, the Latin name for sodium. That's why the symbol Na identifies the element sodium. The other options map to N (Nitrogen), Cl (Chlorine), and K (Potassium, from Kalium).

10. Which term denotes Urgent in the precedence categories?

- A. Routine**
- B. Urgent Surgical**
- C. Urgent**
- D. Priority**

This question tests how precedence categories signal urgency, and the term that directly communicates urgent timing is the word "Urgent." It's the label used to indicate cases should be addressed promptly, within a short timeframe defined by the system. Other terms carry different nuances: Routine means standard, non-urgent processing; Urgent Surgical specifies that the case needs surgical intervention and should be acted on quickly, but with a focus on the surgical aspect; Priority is a general sense of importance or ordering that doesn't by itself fix the exact urgent timing. The straight label "Urgent" is the one that denotes urgency most clearly and without extra qualifiers.
