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Explanations

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1. Which statement best describes the finish of a dewy foundation?

A dewy foundation finish is all about light reflecting softly off moisturized skin. It's designed to add hydration and a gentle, skin-like sheen, giving a luminous glow rather than a flat, matte look. That's why describing it as highly moisturizing with a subtle glow fits best. Matte finishes read as flat and shine-free, while long-wearing powder finishes often introduce a powdery, matte feel, and a heavy coverage with matte look contradicts the light-reflective, hydrated effect of dewy skin.

Color correction relies on opposite hues on the color wheel to neutralize unwanted tones. Redness in the skin is a warm hue, and the color opposite red is green, so a green corrector is the one that neutralizes red patches effectively. Purple sits opposite yellow, so it's used to counteract dull or yellowish undertones, not to address red inflammation like rosacea. Using purple over redness can leave a purple or ashy cast after blending, which doesn't cancel the redness. For rosacea or prominent redness, apply a light green corrector only where needed, blend well, then layer concealer and foundation to match your skin tone. Therefore, purple is not the right tool to neutralize redness.

So the deepest combination—dark brown and black—best achieves the intended increase in intensity.

For this reason, you should never reuse a disposable wand; use a fresh, new wand for each client.

And using a fixed distance from the outer edge of the brow to the temples doesn't reflect individual eye and nose proportions, often resulting in an over- or under-extended tail.

This combination shows the shift from early changes to more noticeable contour changes, where the eye area looks puffy and the midface lacks fullness. Knowing this helps you tailor makeup approaches to counteract those effects—softening under-eye shadows, minimizing the appearance of bags, and using shading and highlighting to recreate perceived buoyancy in the midface. This pattern isn't vague or optional information; within the staging system, these features consistently indicate stage 2, rather than requiring extra information or being applicable only sometimes.
