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Explanations

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1. The word florida in the binomial name Cornus florida (dogwood) is the

- A. Genus
- B. Family
- C. Order
- D. Species epithet**

In binomial nomenclature, a species name has two parts: the first names the genus and the second names the species within that genus. The first word, Cornus, is the genus. The second word, florida, is the species epithet—it identifies the specific species within the genus Cornus. Taken together, Cornus florida is the full species name for the dogwood. The family and order are higher taxonomic levels and aren't part of the two-word species name.

2. Which plant tissue carries water upward from the roots?

- A. Xylem**
- B. Phloem
- C. Cambium
- D. Parenchyma

Water moves upward through a plant mainly through xylem, the tissue built for transporting water and minerals. Xylem consists of hollow, dead cells with thick, lignified walls that form continuous conduits from roots to shoots. Water is pulled upward by the tension created when it evaporates from the leaves (transpiration). This pull is facilitated by cohesion between water molecules and adhesion to the xylem walls, creating a continuous column that can travel against gravity. Root pressure can contribute a little at times, but it's the transpiration-driven cohesion-tension system that drives most of the ascent. Phloem, in contrast, transports sugars and other nutrients, not water movement upward. Cambium is a growth layer that produces new xylem and phloem, and parenchyma is storage tissue, not the main water-conducting tissue. So the tissue carrying water upward from the roots is xylem.

Improvement SAE focuses on making tangible enhancements to an existing operation or its facilities. Remodeling a building fits this because it directly upgrades the structure, functionality, and value of a real-world agricultural setup. The other activities are more about exploring careers, gaining field experience, or providing services rather than making a physical improvement to an operation or its infrastructure.

4. How many membership categories are described?

Counting distinct groups described in the material, there are four membership categories. Entrepreneurship SAE is about creating and running an agricultural business or farming venture. It centers on planning the venture, putting it into action, operating it day to day, and assuming the financial risks involved. This type of experience lets you apply agricultural knowledge to real-world commerce, including budgeting, production, marketing, and decision-making to generate value or profit. The emphasis is on ownership and responsibility for the business, not just working for someone else or observing careers. The other options describe different SAE experiences—placing you in jobs with an employer, conducting experiments, or shadowing to learn about careers—rather than launching and managing your own agricultural enterprise.

Mulch should be applied at a depth that balances moisture conservation, weed suppression, and soil air exchange. For most landscapes, a layer of two to four inches provides that balance: it reduces evaporation and moderates soil temperature while still letting water and oxygen reach the roots. If the mulch is too shallow (about one inch or less), it won't effectively suppress weeds or protect the soil. If it's too deep (four inches or more, especially beyond six inches), it can create suffocating conditions, slow water infiltration, and promote rot or pest problems, particularly if piled against stems or trunks. Keep mulch away from the base of plants to prevent moisture buildup against the bark. So, two to four inches is the typical depth for most mulches.

In flowering plants, a blossom that has only one sex of reproductive parts is described as imperfect. That means it either has only male parts (stamens) or only female parts (pistils). Such flowers are categorized as staminate or pistillate, depending on which parts are present. Because they lack the other reproductive organ, they cannot fertilize by themselves. When a flower contains both stamens and pistils, it is considered perfect (bisexual). The other terms refer to structures that aren't about the flower's reproductive organs: petals are the colorful outer parts, cotyledon is a seed leaf, and plumule is the embryonic shoot.

8. Which material is lava rock an example of?

Materials used as mulch fall into two broad groups: organic and inorganic. Lava rock is mineral-based and comes from volcanic rock, so it is non-living and does not break down significantly. That makes it inorganic mulch. Organic mulches, like pine needles or wood chips, come from plants and animals and decompose over time, adding organic matter to the soil. So lava rock fits the inorganic category because it remains stable, doesn't enrich soil with organic matter, and is used mainly for weed suppression and long-lasting ground cover.

This describes how FFA aims to empower members—through leadership opportunities, personal development, and preparation for careers—within the context of agricultural education. That mission isn't about promoting urban development, nor is it limited to agricultural products alone, which would miss the broader focus on people and their growth. It also isn't about serving only high school teachers; it prioritizes student members and their development, with support extending to educators who guide them.

10. Which is an example of Entrepreneurship SAE?

Entrepreneurship SAE focuses on creating and running an agricultural business, with the student owning, operating, and managing it to earn a profit. That's why raising plants to sell, owning a lawn maintenance business, or owning a farm supply store fit, because each involves starting and managing a venture in agriculture, taking on risk, and making ongoing business decisions. Other SAE types emphasize learning through work or science rather than running a business: planning and conducting an agricultural experiment centers on applying scientific methods and testing ideas; placing students in jobs outside the regular classroom hours is a placement experience, giving hands-on work with an employer; and learning about agriculture through observation is more about gaining knowledge through watching and describing activities, not operating a business. So the example that best illustrates entrepreneurship is the one involving ownership and operation of an agricultural business.
