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Explanations

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1. Which term describes the practice of removing voting rights from Black citizens through voting barriers?

- A. Grandfather clause
- B. Poll tax

Disenfranchisement is the practice of taking away or denying the right to vote. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Southern states used this to strip Black citizens of political power, despite the 15th Amendment. They imposed voting barriers like poll taxes and literacy tests, and even used devices such as the grandfather clause to help whites vote while keeping Black voters out. This broader term fits best because it names the ongoing action of removing voting rights, whereas the other terms describe specific barriers or exceptions used to carry out that policy.

2. Which policy kept the United States out of foreign wars in the interwar period?

The Neutrality Acts established the policy that kept the United States out of foreign wars during the interwar years by creating a formal, law-based stance of neutrality. Passed in the mid-1930s, these laws restricted actions that could draw the U.S. into conflicts—banning arms sales and loans to belligerents and enforcing cash-and-carry trade rather than credit sales. This legal framework aimed to prevent entanglements similar to those that pulled the United States into World War I, even as public sentiment leaned toward avoiding involvement. While broader attitudes like isolationism shaped public thinking and non-intervention describes a general stance, the Neutrality Acts are the specific policy tool that codified the United States' non-entry into foreign wars during the interwar period. Pacifism, meanwhile, is an anti-war ideology rather than a government policy.

Decolonization is the process by which colonies won independence from imperial rule, and it surged after World War II. The war left European powers weakened economically and militarily, making it harder to maintain overseas empires. At the same time, nationalist movements within colonies grew stronger and gained international support for self-rule, especially as the United Nations and global opinion promoted self-determination. This combination of internal push and external legitimacy led many African and Asian territories to shed colonial rule in the 1950s and 1960s. The other options don't explain the broad shift toward independence after WWII: the Great Recession is an economic crisis years later, Occupy Wall Street is a post-2008 protest movement, and the Iraqi War is a 2003 conflict unrelated to the wave of decolonization that followed WWII.

Nativism describes the belief that native-born Americans should hold political and social dominance, and it often fueled anti-immigrant sentiment in the late 19th century. As waves of newcomers arrived from Europe and Asia, fears about job competition, cultural change, and political influence led native-born residents and some politicians to push for restrictions on immigration and policies that favored those already established. This mindset helped shape laws and public attitudes aimed at limiting newcomers. Americanization is about programs to assimilate immigrants into American culture, not about native-born dominance, so it doesn't fit as well. Urbanization centers on the growth of cities and doesn't address attitudes toward immigrants, and racial segregation involves separating people by race rather than the dominance of native-born citizens.

5. Which act established the draft for World War I?

The essential idea is that World War I required a large army quickly, so the United States enacted a formal system of conscription through the Selective Service Act of 1917. This law authorized the registration of men aged roughly 18 to 45 and established a lottery to determine who would be drafted into military service, enabling a rapid buildup for combat in Europe. The Militia Act of 1903 reorganized state militias into the National Guard and increased federal oversight, but it did not create the nationwide draft for WWI. The other names listed aren't the official title of the WWI conscription law, and there wasn't a separate act commonly known as a "Draft Act" for this purpose.

The main idea here is preventing the spread of an ideology by actively keeping it from extending beyond its current borders. After World War II, U.S. policymakers argued that if communism could be contained within its existing regions, it wouldn't spread to other countries. This led to a strategy of containment, using a mix of political pressure, economic aid, and military commitments to block further expansion. Examples include the Truman Doctrine, which pledged support to free peoples resisting subjugation; the Marshall Plan, which rebuilt Western Europe to make communist expansion less appealing; and the creation of NATO to deter Soviet influence. Containment is about stopping expansion, not simply threatening retaliation (deterrence), staying out of global affairs (isolationism), or trying to extend influence through conquest (expansionism).

7. Which act limited the power of labor unions after World War II?

After World War II, lawmakers aimed to curb the growing influence of unions by tightening what unions could do and giving government authorities more tools to intervene in labor clashes. This act did several key things: it banned or restricted certain union practices like jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts, required union leaders to sign affidavits that they were not communists, and gave the president power to call a cooling-off period in strikes that risked public safety or national security. It also allowed states to pass right-to-work laws, which made union membership voluntary rather than mandatory and weakened union financial power in those states. The other acts mentioned either build up union power or address issues outside union influence. The Wagner Act (National Labor Relations Act) from 1935 protected unions' rights to organize and bargain collectively, rather than limit them. The National Labor Relations Act is another name for that same 1935 law, not a postwar limiter. The Fair Labor Standards Act deals with minimum wage and working hours, not union power. So the Taft-Hartley Act is the one that directly restricted and limited labor union power after the war.

8. Which spacecraft milestone signaled the start of the Space Race, as the first satellite launched by the USSR?

Sputnik was the Soviet Union's first artificial satellite, launched in 1957. Its successful orbit proved that a nation could build rockets capable of reaching space and placing objects into orbit, which instantly reframed the Cold War as a high-stakes space competition. This show of technological capability spurred a dramatic U.S. response—massive investment in science and engineering, the creation of NASA, and new education and research programs—to catch up. While later milestones like Explorer 1 (the United States' first satellite), Vostok (the first human in space), and Apollo 11 (the Moon landing) all follow, Sputnik's orbital launch is what signaled the start of the Space Race.

9. Which law restricted freedoms of African Americans in the South during Reconstruction?

During Reconstruction, Southern states pushed through Black Codes to restrict the newly won freedoms of African Americans. These laws aimed to keep a white-controlled social and labor order by imposing curfews, vagrancy penalties, requirements to sign work contracts, limits on property rights, and other restrictions that effectively bound Black people to low-wage labor and structured social control. The result was to curb political and economic power for Black Americans right after emancipation, making Black Codes the direct answer to the question. Jim Crow laws come later, after Reconstruction, and formalize segregation in public life. Vagrancy laws were a tool used within the Black Codes, but the broader legal framework during Reconstruction that restricted freedoms was the Black Codes. Segregation ordinances describe later measures enforcing separation rather than restricting basic liberties immediately after emancipation.

This question tests your knowledge of a major modern conflict that began with a U.S.-led invasion in 2003. In March 2003, the United States, with coalition partners, invaded Iraq—Operation Iraqi Freedom—citing concerns about weapons of mass destruction and Saddam Hussein's regime. The invasion quickly toppled Saddam, but it precipitated a long, contentious postwar period marked by insurgency, occupation challenges, and debates about foreign intervention and nation-building. The other events don't fit the 2003 invasion trigger: the War in Afghanistan began in 2001 after the 9/11 attacks; the Cuban Missile Crisis occurred in 1962 during the Cold War; and decolonization describes a broad, mid-20th-century process of colonies gaining independence, not a single invasion in 2003.
