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Explanations

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1. In what year did John F. Kennedy deliver his inaugural address?

- A. 1963
- B. 1961**

The year of Kennedy's inaugural address is 1961. Inaugural addresses are given at the start of a president's term, and Kennedy began his presidency on January 20, 1961 after winning the 1960 election. The other years don't correspond to the moment he took office: 1963 is when he was assassinated, 1959 is before he became president, and 1965 is after his term. The speech you're thinking of happened in 1961, on the day he was sworn in.

2. What is true about metacognition?

Metacognition is awareness of and control over your own thinking and learning processes. It means knowing what you know about how you learn, and using that knowledge to plan, monitor, and adjust your approaches as you study or solve problems. This definition captures the essence because metacognition includes both recognizing what strategies help you understand something (knowledge about cognition) and actively managing your thinking while learning (regulation of cognition). Saying you know about your own thinking is exactly what helps you decide when to skim a text, when to slow down and re-read, or when to change a problem-solving approach. For example, when you read a challenging paragraph, a metacognitive reader will notice if comprehension is slipping, pause to paraphrase, ask questions, and decide to reread or seek help. That self-check and adjustment illustrate planning, monitoring, and evaluating your own thinking. The other options describe memory, language skills, or physical actions, which are related to cognition but do not capture the self-reflective, strategic aspect that metacognition entails.

Register is about the level of formality in language depending on the situation. Everyday talk among friends uses an informal, relaxed style called the casual register. You'll hear contractions, slang, and familiar speech patterns that assume a shared background and comfort. Among the choices, the term that best matches this casual style is the one labeled as causal, which aligns with casual language even though it's typically spelled casual. The other terms point to different social contexts: formal is official or ceremonial speech, intimate is language used with very close relationships and private vocabulary, and consultative sits in between formal and casual, like in teacher–student or advisor–client conversations.

The main idea here is how relative clauses attach to a noun to give more detail. The clause who could surf but who was afraid to swim describes someone, and it follows the noun that it's describing. That noun is a girl—the head of the noun phrase after the verb. The relative pronoun who points back to that noun, not to Ella as a whole or to the verbs themselves. So the word the relative clauses refer to is girl.

5. In ancient Greek drama, a choral song describing the adventures of a god or heroic figure is called:

Dithyramb is the term for a choral song performed in ancient Greek drama that describes the adventures of a god or heroic figure. These wild, ecstatic choruses were originally sung in honor of Dionysus and often told mythic stories, serving as a direct precursor to tragedy as a dramatic form. The other terms refer to different kinds of songs not specifically tied to this dramatic ritual: a paeon is a thanksgiving song, typically directed at Apollo; an ode is a general lyrical poem or song; a hymn is a religious praise song. Dithyramb uniquely captures the Dionysian choral tradition that centers mythic adventures within early Greek drama.

6. Which line uses visual imagery to describe light and movement in an animal?

Visual imagery is about painting a scene with what you can see. The line with the cat stands out because it ties light directly to the animal: "flashing with sunlight" creates a bright, glinting image on the cat's coat, as if light is moving across its fur. The description of the cat as ginger and streaked adds vivid color and texture, helping you picture both the animal and the shifting light. The other options either describe movement or texture without the strong light interaction on an animal, or describe non-animal subjects, so they don't evoke the same clear light-and-motion picture. So this line best creates a vivid visual image of light and movement in an animal.

7. Who wrote Prometheus Unbound?

Prometheus Unbound is a dramatic poem written by Percy Bysshe Shelley, dating from around 1820. Shelley uses the Prometheus myth to explore liberty, human resilience, and resistance to tyranny—a hallmark of his radical, visionary Romantic stance. This work stands apart from the others listed because, while Keats, Byron, and Wordsworth were all influential Romantic poets with their own notable themes and styles, none of them authored Prometheus Unbound. Keats is best known for his odes and sensuous imagery, Byron for his narrative and satirical poetry, and Wordsworth for his nature-centered contemplations; Shelley is the one who crafted this particular dramatic meditation on freedom and oppression.

8. The primary constriction at the lips.

The place where the air is most restricted defines the sound's articulation. If that primary constriction is at the lips, the sound is bilabial because both lips come together or nearly touch to create the closure or narrowing. Examples of bilabial sounds include p, b, and m, which are produced with the lips themselves forming the constriction. This differs from labiodental sounds, which involve the lower lip against the upper teeth; alveolar sounds, where the tongue tip or blade makes contact with the alveolar ridge; and palatal sounds, where the body of the tongue presses against the hard palate. Since the constriction is at the lips, bilabial is the correct label.

9. Novels, short stories, and fables are examples of what literary form?

Prose fiction is writing that tells imagined stories in ordinary language, arranged in sentences and paragraphs rather than verse. Novels, short stories, and fables fit this clearly because each presents a narrative with characters, plots, and settings conveyed through prose, not through rhythmic line breaks. Poetry relies on verse and meter, and drama is designed for performance, typically featuring dialogue and stage directions rather than a continuous narrative. Nonfiction prose describes real people, events, or information. So the best fit for these examples is prose fiction—narrative writing in ordinary language about imagined worlds or events.

10. Which sentence is in the imperative mood?

A. Wait for your turn.

B. The waiter, wait for your turn.

Imperative mood is used for commands or direct requests, with the subject usually omitted and the verb in its base form. In "Wait for your turn," the speaker directly tells the listener what to do, and the verb "wait" is in its base form with an implied "you" as the subject. That straightforward command is exactly what the imperative mood expresses. The other sentences don't function as commands. "You should wait for your turn" gives advice and uses should, so it's not in the imperative. "Will you wait for your turn?" is a question, not a command. The line addressing a person as "The waiter" followed by a command is awkward and not a standard imperative structure, so it doesn't fit the typical imperative usage as cleanly.
