1. Which code is used for water rescue?

- A. FVLA
- B. FWTR**
- C. FVEH
- D. FVAJ

Water rescue in this coding system is indicated by the WTR segment, a shorthand that denotes water-related incidents. The code that includes this water shorthand, FWTR, maps to a water rescue assignment, making it the correct choice. The other options lack the water reference and would correspond to different incident types, not water rescue.

2. Which code is used for water cutoff?

- A. FWTR
- B. FWAC**
- C. FVAJ
- D. FVNS

In this coding system, water-related actions are built from a prefix that signals the water function and a suffix that specifies the action. The suffix that denotes a water cutoff is the two-letter combination that the codebook uses for shutoff, so the form FWAC directly encodes "water cutoff." The other suffixes point to different water actions or statuses and do not indicate a cutoff, so they wouldn't be used to signify shutting off the water. That's why FWAC is the correct and best choice for a water cutoff.

3. Which incident type is used for a general incident that is not a fire?

- A. Other Fire
- B. Private / Telephone Alarm
- C. Other Service**
- D. Rope / High Angle Rescue

In fire dispatch coding, calls are sorted into broad incident types to guide how responders are dispatched. If the situation isn't a fire, an alarm activation, or a specialized rescue, it goes into a general service-type category. The catch-all nature of "Other Service" makes it the best fit for a general incident that isn't fire-related, because it covers miscellaneous requests and on-scene tasks that don't fit the more specific categories. The other options point to particular kinds of incidents—something fire-related, an alarm from a private system, or a specialized rope/high-angle rescue—none of which match a generic non-fire situation as well as the broad "Other Service" category does.

4. Which code is used for mass decontamination response at the UK Commonwealth Stadium?

Mass decontamination response codes are used to quickly signal responders to activate decon operations for a large number of people, especially at big venues or events. The specific code that includes both the mass decon directive and the venue name directly identifies the required operation and where it should be deployed, which is exactly what's needed for a mass decontamination effort at the UK Commonwealth Stadium. The other options point to unrelated situations (lifting assistance, a hazmat scenario at a clandestine lab, or a missing person), so they don't fit the mass decon needs at that stadium.

5. Which action best ensures coordination when multiple agencies respond to a single incident?

- A. Do nothing until all agencies arrive and then decide
- B. Rely on a single agency to lead without ICS
- C. Use only informal communications without ICS
- D. Establish a unified command structure and interoperable radio channels**

When multiple agencies respond to the same incident, establishing a unified command structure and interoperable radio channels ensures coordinated action. A unified command brings representatives from all involved agencies into one coordinating authority, so there is a single set of incident objectives, shared priorities, and clear roles. This prevents competing orders and duplicate efforts, allowing for faster, more efficient decision-making and resource management across jurisdictions. Interoperable radio channels are essential because they let responders from different agencies communicate in real time, share updates, request support, and coordinate movements and tactics across teams. Without common communications, important information can get lost or misinterpreted, and actions can conflict. Options that wait for everyone to arrive, rely on a single agency to lead without a formal system, or depend on informal communications lack the structure and reliable cross-agency communication needed for a synchronized response, leading to confusion and delays.

6. Which code corresponds to Transformer Fire?

- A. FTRS

In this coding scheme, the Fire prefix signals a fire incident, and the subtype is shown by a compact form of the keyword for the specific danger. For Transformer Fire, the word Transformer is shortened to its consonant core TRN, and you attach that to the Fire prefix, giving FTRN. That precise abbreviation pattern is why FTRN is the best match here. The other endings don't follow the standard consonant-skeleton for Transformer, so they wouldn't correctly identify the Transformer Fire subtype.

7. What is the purpose of the Incident Command Post (ICP) in incident management?

The on-scene command hub is the Incident Command Post where primary command is established and coordinated, driving the overall response. From this location, the incident commander sets objectives, prioritizes actions, and maintains direct control over tactics, logistics, and communications with units, agencies, and any support staff. Positioning the ICP near the incident but safe allows leaders to monitor ground operations while making timely decisions and keeping everyone aligned on the incident priorities. This is about directing the response, not about sheltering civilians or handling routine storage. Civilians may shelter elsewhere, after-action discussions occur later or in a separate setting, and equipment storage is typically at staging or supply areas. Understanding this helps explain why the ICP is the central point for decision-making and coordination during the incident.

8. Which code corresponds to Gasoline/Fuel Leak?

- A. Felf

Gasoline or fuel leaks are coded with Fgas. In these dispatch codes, the leading F marks a fire/hazard situation, and the following letters describe the specific hazard. The letters gas clearly indicate a gas/fuel issue, so Fgas directly represents Gasoline/Fuel Leak. The other abbreviations do not spell out gas/fuel and would correspond to different incident types, so they aren't the correct match.

9. Which code corresponds to the description AIRCRAFT ALERT 3?

- A. FAA1
- B. FAA2
- C. FAA3**
- D. FASS

Codes are built to match the described level and category. In this set, the aircraft-alert family uses a prefix that marks the domain and a suffix number that equals the alert level. AIRCRAFT ALERT 3 should be represented by the code that ends with the number 3 in the aircraft-alert group, which is FAA3. The other options don't fit because they either show a different level (FAA1 or FAA2) or come from a different code family altogether (FASS), which doesn't align with the described aviation alert at level 3.

10. Which code corresponds to the description AIRCRAFT ALERT 1?

- A. FAA2
- B. FASB
- C. FAA3
- D. FAA1**

Air dispatch codes for aircraft alerts use a prefix with a numeric suffix where the number shows the alert level. AIRCRAFT ALERT 1 corresponds to the code that carries the level indicator 1, signaling the first/lowest alert. Higher alert levels use 2 or 3, so those codes map to AIRCRAFT ALERT 2 or AIRCRAFT ALERT 3. A code like FASB doesn't follow this numeric pattern, so it isn't used for these aircraft alert levels. Therefore, the code that matches AIRCRAFT ALERT 1 is the one with the 1 as the level indicator.
