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Explanations

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1. In 1990-present, TANF introduced what approach?

TANF marked a shift to a work-focused, time-limited approach to welfare. Passed in 1996, it replaced the open-ended entitlement model of Aid to Families with Dependent Children with a block grant to states and a set of requirements aimed at moving people into employment. The core elements are that benefits are time-limited, participants must engage in work or work-related activities (with education or training as needed), and states provide supportive services such as childcare to enable work. Noncompliance can lead to sanctions, reinforcing the push toward work. This combination—mandated time limits, job-focused requirements, and child care support—constitutes the comprehensive approach TANF introduced, rather than universal benefits, elimination of welfare, or benefits that are solely education-based.

Representativeness is about how closely a sample mirrors the population in its key characteristics. When a sample's makeup—such as age, gender, race, income, or other relevant traits—matches the population, the findings are more likely to generalize to that population. If the sample reflects the population well, you can trust that the results apply beyond the specific individuals studied. A statistic is simply a numerical summary calculated from the sample data, like a mean or proportion; it describes the sample, not how well the sample represents the population. A probability sample is a method designed to achieve representativeness by giving every member of the population a known chance of selection, but the concept being tested is the representativeness itself. Accidental sampling, on the other hand, is nonrandom and often yields a biased, unrepresentative sample, which undermines representativeness.

Establishing a Relational Base is about building trust and a collaborative alliance, including agreeing on goals and roles. Separation and Termination addresses planning for closure, evaluating progress, and ensuring continuity of care. The option that describes conflict and cohesion does not represent a formal stage; it reflects ongoing relational dynamics that can occur within any stage, rather than a separate phase with its own tasks.

In Reality Therapy, the quality world is your personal store of mental pictures of people, events, places, things, beliefs, and values that you believe will meet your needs. These pictures represent what you want to have in your life and how you want to feel, guiding the choices you make to satisfy needs such as belonging, power, freedom, fun, and survival. The therapist helps you identify these pictures and compare your current behavior to what would better satisfy those needs, encouraging more effective ways to meet them. The other options don't fit because they don't describe this active, personally held set of images that drive your wants and choices—things like a dream database, genetic predispositions, or a chart of the therapeutic relationship miss the content and function of the quality world.

Unconscious processes shape how people act in groups, with individuals often merging their identities with the group and turning to a single leader as a stand-in for a parental figure. In this view, the group functions as a collective ego, and the libidinal energy and emotions directed at the leader and the group as a whole can override personal inhibitions and critical judgment. Freud's *Group Psychology and the Analysis of the Ego* is the foundational work that articulates this approach. It argues that in crowds, people are drawn to a common leader and ideal, and their personal wills blend into a shared impulse. The leader's charisma becomes a focal point for identification, providing a sense of unity and simplicity of purpose. This process reduces self-awareness and allows strong emotions—whether passionate or aggressive—to surge within the group. The crowd thus operates with a kind of collective psyche, where individual differences recede and suggestion and imitation become powerful forces. Other major works focus more on individuals rather than group dynamics. Jung's *Modern Man in Search of a Soul* centers on individual psyche and the process of individuation. Adler's *The Courage to Be* emphasizes social interest and personal courage within an individual framework. Erikson's *Identity and the Life Cycle* traces psychosocial development across the lifespan rather than the mechanics of group behavior. Therefore, Freud's exploration of crowds and the analysis of the ego best fit the question about psychoanalytic interpretations of group behavior.

Autoplastic adaptation is the process of adjustment that comes from internal changes within the person—new coping skills, reinterpreting situations, and altering emotional or cognitive responses to stress. This internal shift changes how the individual experiences and handles life events without needing to alter the external world, which is why it's the best fit for "adjustment that results from changes within an individual." By contrast, alloplastic adaptation involves changing the outside environment to reduce stress (like changing jobs or relocating). Conversion refers to distress expressed as physical symptoms, not general internal adjustment, and inversion isn't a standard term for this context.

Wage replacement for injuries that happen on the job is provided through workers' compensation, a no-fault system designed to support employees who are injured or become ill due to work. It ensures you receive income while you're unable to work and also covers medical treatment related to the injury. Benefits can include temporary partial or total disability payments and, in some cases, permanent disability benefits, along with vocational rehabilitation if you need retraining to return to work. The key point is that you don't have to prove your employer was at fault to receive these benefits, and the program is funded by employer premiums. Other options address different needs—SSI provides cash assistance for low-income individuals with disabilities, TANF supports families in need, and Unemployment Insurance offers benefits after job loss not due to injury. Therefore, the program that specifically provides wage replacement for work-related injuries is workers' compensation.

There's no random selection or predefined criteria guiding who ends up in the group, which makes the process quick and inexpensive but introduces bias and limits how well the findings generalize to a larger population. Purposive sampling, by contrast, selects cases based on specific characteristics or a purpose, not just who happens to be first. Quota sampling aims to fill predefined proportions or quotas to resemble the population, rather than starting with the first case seen. Non-probability sampling is a broad category that includes methods lacking random selection, but the situation described matches the convenience/accidental approach most directly.

A carve-out describes a setup where a specific type of care is removed from the plan's general benefits and managed separately, usually under a contract with a specialized organization. This is different from discounts, premium changes, or requirements for second opinions, which relate to pricing, plan structure, or clinical processes rather than how a specific service is organized and managed within the plan.

The main idea is that clients must know what will be kept confidential and what won't from the very start of the relationship. In social work, confidentiality isn't absolute; there are clearly defined exceptions, such as reporting abuse, protecting someone from harm, or complying with a court order. By describing these limits early and obtaining informed consent, you help clients understand how their information will be used, who may access it (for example, supervisors or other professionals involved in care), and under what circumstances disclosures could occur. This upfront, transparent discussion supports client autonomy, builds trust, and aligns with ethical standards, and it applies to all clients—not just minors or agency staff. For instance, you might say you'll share information with a supervisor for consultation and that you must report suspected abuse or imminent danger if it arises, and you would document the client's understanding and consent. Therefore, stating that this practice should happen early is the most accurate reflection.
