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Explanations

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1. Which Republic Act mandates Rizal's works in education?

The key idea here is how education policy uses law to shape what students learn about national history and identity. Republic Act No. 1425, known as the Rizal Law, requires that the life, works, and writings of Jose Rizal be included in the curricula of all public and private schools. It emphasizes teaching Rizal's works, especially his novels Noli Me Tangere and El Filibusterismo, to foster patriotism and civic consciousness among learners. This law ties Rizal's contributions to the educational goal of building national identity, ensuring every student is exposed to his ideas within the classroom. The other acts cover topics unrelated to curricular content about Rizal, so they do not mandate his works in education.

The main idea here is how we mentally organize knowledge into units called concepts. A concept is a mental representation that groups together objects, events, or ideas that share common features, making it easier to categorize and reason about them. In this sense, the term described is concept, because it refers to the basic unit we use to sort information into categories. A prototype, by contrast, is the most typical example within a category, used to judge whether something belongs there, not the general representation of the category itself. A schema is a broader framework or set of expectations about a domain, guiding how we interpret new information by drawing on multiple concepts. Memory is about storing and recalling information, not specifically about categorizing knowledge. So the best fit is concept, the mental representation that underpins how we group knowledge into categories.

Reproducing observed behavior through imitation is what this item tests. In observational learning, a learner must be able to translate what they've seen into actual action. Memory skills would cover recalling information, not performing it. Interference refers to factors that disrupt learning or performance, not the act of imitation itself. Assimilation deals with fitting new information into existing mental frameworks, not replicating observed actions.

Symbolic representation involves using symbols to stand for objects, actions, or ideas that aren't physically present, which allows for abstract thinking. This goes beyond concrete pictures or mental images, which is why iconic representation stays tied to perceptual likeness. The other terms describe instructional strategies or developmental sequencing rather than a mental representation type.

Ignatius of Loyola and John Wesley founded other movements, not La Salle's educational order, and the La Salle Schools term refers to the schools run by his institute.

This framework defined how scholars studied and taught, shaping curricula, method, and disputation in universities. While a medieval university provided the setting for such study, the concept itself centers on the method and mindset of learning rather than on nation-building or monastic life.

The main idea here is that the Philippines' 1987 Constitution places the strongest emphasis on education when it comes to allocating resources. When the budget prioritizes education, it supports universal access to quality basic schooling, strengthens teachers and schools, and funds essential learning materials and programs. This investment yields multiple benefits: a more skilled workforce, higher economic growth, better civic participation, and greater social equity. While defense, health, and infrastructure are important and funded as needed, the constitutional directive elevates education above them as the key driver of progress.

Learning to live together is about how we relate to others, collaborate, and build a peaceful, inclusive community. It focuses on developing social skills, respect for differences, empathy, and the ability to work in teams or groups. In a classroom, this means practices that help students listen to one another, negotiate roles, resolve conflicts, and understand how their actions affect others. These relational abilities are what let people coexist harmoniously in a diverse society. Learning to know is about acquiring information and understanding concepts. Learning to do centers on applying skills and performing tasks. Learning to be involves personal growth, self-awareness, and autonomy. While all are important, the dimension that specifically targets relationships among people is learning to live together.

It highlights how a teacher's ideas, values, and methods can ripple through students' lives, shaping choices and opportunities long after the lesson is over. That sense of influence extending through time is what makes this quotation particularly fitting for describing a teacher's enduring impact. The other statements focus on external aspects of the profession—guidance by a higher power, or system-level standards and credentials. They describe frameworks and sources that shape teaching, but they don't convey the personal, lasting reach of a teacher's influence in the same vivid way.

Structured training within organized groups provided the education pathway for the middle class. In medieval towns, the guild system organized how people learned a trade and conducted business. A young entrant would become an apprentice under a master, learning the craft, basic literacy and arithmetic, and the practices of the trade. After years of work, they could advance to a journeyman, traveling to gain broader experience, and eventually become a master who could run their own workshop and take on apprentices. The guilds set standards for skill, regulated membership, and offered mutual aid, networks, and status, all of which helped ambitious middle-class families improve economically and socially. This framework is why the guild system best represents education for the middle class, as it directly supplied the training and credentials that enabled social mobility within towns. Chivalry refers to a knightly code, and while crafts and merchant groups exist, the overarching educational pathway tied to skill formation and advancement for the middle class is captured by the guild system.
